Our staff will be happy to help you with any questions you may have regarding our Terms and Conditions of Business. - Agency. As auctioneers we usually act on behalf of the seller whose identity, for reasons of confidentiality, is not normally disclosed. If you buy at auction your contract for the goods is with the seller, not with us as auctioneer.
- 3. Estimates. Estimates are intended to indicate the hammer price that a particular lot may achieve. The lower estimate may represent the reserve price (the minimum price for which a lot may be sold) and cannot be below the reserve price. Estimates do not include the buyer's premium, VAT or other taxes and fees (where chargeable). Estimates may be altered by a saleroom notice.
- 4. Buyer's Premium. The Terms of Sale oblige you to pay a buyer's premium on the hammer price of each lot purchased. Our rate of buyer's premium is 25% of the first £100,000 of the hammer price, reducing to 20% of the hammer price from £100,001 to £1,000,000 and then 12% of the hammer price in excess of £1,000,000. 



Leaves and Fragments



Jerome (Saint) Commentary on Isaiah, single leaf from a very early decorated manuscript, single leaf, single column, 30 lines, in a fine early Carolingian minuscule, with some Uncial features, two small initials 'V' (opening: Vox clamantis indeserto' and 'Vox dicentis clama' respectively) set in the margin and touched with terracotta red, now oxidised, recovered from a binding hence scuffed and stained, old water-damage to lower portion with the script faded in places but still legible, words 'wiecklichyt', 'wiecklich', and 'prestiglich' added to outer margin of recto in a small hand datable to the 13th-century, probably Low Countries or northern Germany, small folio, 275 x 220mm., last decades of 8th century or first decades of 9th century.

🙏 Highly remarkable leaf from a very early codex containing the Latin commentary on Isaiah attributed to St. Jerome (c. 342-420).

The text includes parts of Book XI, chapter 40. The handwriting and the later glosses visible in the margin suggest that the original manuscript might have been produced in the Carolingian central areas of the Low Countries or the German regions nearby. The form of some letters display elements characteristic of Uncial script, features which point towards a very early date for the original manuscript, probably the late eighth century. Isaiah as well as his commentators circulated largely in the Carolingian age, and played a fundamental role in the development of medieval theology. Jerome's commentary had been, for example, copied in Corbie in the eighth century, and its study is well documented in the milieu of the Carolingian court.

This leaf is from the dawn of this 'rediscovery' of Isaiah, and is by far the earliest manuscript of Jerome's commentary to come to the market.

A bifolium datable to the ninth century from a dismembered commentary to the Book of Job attributed to St. Jerome (PL 26: 619-802), one of the most famous authors and translators from the earliest period of Latin Christianity.

The original manuscript was produced in a German scriptorium, and these leaves were later re-used, folded in half, as a binding to cover a book in small quarto format. The text copied on one side contains a portion from chapter 24 of Jerome's commentary (incipit: 'habebat justiciae aut etiam innocentiae'). The text transcribed on the reverse is quite illegible.

The original codex was produced in the German area in the eleventh century. The handwriting reveals similarities with some contemporary manuscripts copied at the Imperial Benedictine Abbey of Fulda, one of the most celebrated German scriptoria.

The short additions for liturgical reading, which are visible on the leaves, indicate the use of the (now dismembered) manuscript throughout the Middle Ages.

Twelfth century English Bible.- FIVE LARGE FRAGMENTS FROM A GIANT LATIN BIBLE, decorated manuscript on parchment, five strips from a single large bifolium, each c. 395 x 60mm, three strips cut horizontally from bifolium, two vertically, remains of double column, up to 41 lines, finely written in two different sizes in an English early gothic hand, in black ink, small initials alternating in green and red, three larger initials in green, blue, and red, the latter holding baubles, numbered in pencil by N.R. Ker in July 1974, all re-used in binding, therefore somewhat defective, a few scuffs and folds; discoloured in places, England, early 12th century.

A These five large vertical cuttings, once in the famous library of Ampleforth Abbey, are all that survive of a lost monumental English Romanesque Bible, written in two columns on thick parchment of excellent quality.

The most complete fragment contains 41 lines, and in all likelihood only one line of text is missing: we can therefore suggest that the original leaf measured at least 456mm by 315mm. Manuscript English Bibles with similar or comparable dimensions can be counted on one hand: the Bury Bible (c. 1130, 525 x 320mm; Cambridge, Corpus Christi College MS 211); the Lambeth Bible (c. 1150, 520 x 325mm; Lambeth Palace, MS 3), the Lothian Bible (c. 1220, 470 x 320mm; New York, Pierpont Morgan Library MS 791), while the Northumberland Bible (c. 1250-60; sold at Sotheby's, 8 July 2014, lot 49) measured 'only' 325mm by 210mm.

The fragments offered here are from the *capitula* of I Maccabees; they contain the text of 1:3-62 and 4:18-5 and 23, and include part of the running title 'liber' in the upper margin on one leaf, and instructions for the rubricator ('expliciunt capitula. Incipit ad maccabeorum').

Fragments from English Romanesque Giant Bibles are of the greatest rarity, and only two are recorded in private hands. In Ker's census *Fragments of Medieval Manuscripts Used as Pastedowns in Oxford Bindings* (2004), among the 2,200 fragments recorded, not a single one is from a twelfth- century English Bible of similar size.

St. Augustine.- Two fragments from Pseudo-Augustine In Cathedra S. Petri, decorated manuscript on parchment, in Latin, 2 strips cut vertically from a single leaf, now justaposed, remains of double column, 32 lines, written in a late Carolingian minscule, on recto three 1-to 2-line initials painted in red, on verso two 1-to 2-line initials in identical style, remains of larger initial in red, lower margin of one strip slightly cockled, portions of text lacking, double-sided woodenframed and glazed, c.317 x 240mm.,12th century.

♣ Two strips from a parchment manuscript, originally written in two columns, and containing a substantial portion from the Sermon on the Chair of St. Peter, at that time attributed to Augustine and included in the series De Sanctis (Sermo no. 190; PL 39, 2191). The sermon is an important piece of evidence for the Petrine office, the authority of the Pope, and generally the primacy of the Roman Church. It enjoyed a wide circulation in manuscript during the Middle Ages and its text was often included in collections of Augustine's sermons as well as in liturgical manuscripts, in order to be read on 22nd February, the date of the feast of Saint Peter in cathedra.

The text of this sermon, composed in about 460, is divided into two sections. Its first half justifies the solemnity of the feast and the foundation of the Church, including the famous statement from Matthew's Gospel (Mt 16,18): "You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church". The content of its second half is quite different - the author denounces pagan superstitions, and especially funerary meals (the custom of placing food and wine on the tombs of the dead), still associated with the feast of the Chair of Saint Peter.

The leaf comes from a dismembered large-size Bible, produced in a medieval German *scriptorium* and copied in a large Carolingian hand, evidently for lectern use. The text contains the final part of the first chapter of Maccabees I (1: 53-67, *incipit*: 'haec fieri cogerent'), and the first part of the second chapter, 2: 1-32.

Breviary.- Single leaf, manuscript on parchment, single column, 24/25 lines, written in a neat late Carolingian hand with a few features more angular, some capitals set out, one blank space for initial, some marginalia in a different hand, this same hand has drawn a detailed pen-portrait of a man's face, slightly scuffed and water-stained, small folio, 261 x 188mm., possibly France, 12th century.

A This leaf from a twelfth-century Breviary contains part of the readings for the Dominica in Quinquagesima, and in particular the final part of Luke:18 (from 'adsumpsit lesus duodecim discipulos suos' until the end), as well as the first part of the homily De illuminatione caecitas humanae by Gregorius Magnus. The original liturgical manuscript was probably produced in a scriptorium located at a Cistercian monastery.



♣ These highly significant leaves come from a decorated manuscript containing the famous *Historia Scholastica*, a basic textbook for students composed by the French mid-twelfth-century theologian Peter Comestor or Peter Manducator (literally 'Peter the Eater'). The work is a sacred history, from the Creation to the episodes narrated in the Acts of the Apostles; it enjoyed a wide diffusion in the Middle Ages, and was translated into several vernacular languages. The quire offered here contains part of the historical narrative of Genesis, the creation, the fall of Adam and Eve in Paradise, the flood and the ark, etc., until the arrival in the Land of Canaan.

The *Historia Scholastica* also represents a precious source for Christian iconography. Of the greatest significance is Comestor's description of the serpent which tempted Eve; the French theologian claimed it would have had the face of a young girl, greatly influencing subsequent iconography. This description is included within these six leaves.

🙏 An apparently unrecorded version of the Harmonia Evangelii, a POPULAR WORK WHICH ATTEMPTED TO COMPILE A SINGLE NARRATIVE OF THE Passion of Christ by Harmonising the four Gospels. Single Gospel accounts, or synopses, were already composed in the second century AD, as evinced by the well-known Tatian's Diatesseron originally composed in Greek and Syriac. Countless other harmonies were composed throughout the Middle Ages, in Latin or vernacular languages, replete with variations, local readings, and commentaries. In the fifteenth century much theological debate focused on this genre and several theologians, including Jean Gerson, discussed which Gospels to include or give prominence to, the sequence of materials, the order of the episodes narrated in each Gospel, and differences in the narratives. In the sixteenth century, and especially during the Reformation, the presentation of the different texts in parallel columns became widespread.

This manuscript offers a text which appears to stand before these methodological developments, and is evidently unrecorded. It opens on fol. 1r with the passage from John 12:4, 'Ante sex dies pasche' and ends 'lamentatis filii'. A short epilogue follows, (*Passio*, fols. 13v-14r), beginning with the words 'Altera die primus', and ending with 'a Judeis pecuniam accepisse'.

* Witnessed by St. Gilbert of Sempringham. Gilbert of Sempringham (monastic reformer, 1083-1189), founder of the Gilbertine order. The double Priory of Sempringham, Lincolnshire, was the foundation house of the only English monastic order, with a special emphasis on the religious life of women. Gilbert lived to extreme old age and would have witnessed such an important document.

The document can be dated by the inclusion of German, Abbot of Selby which places the grant between 1153 and 1160. That date is confirmed by BL Add. Ch. 20731 and 21137 which are unusually specifically dated to 1150 and are in chirograph form and record the original grant by William de Reimes of the thicket (brucia) of 'Fredegestehae' to Sempringham as made with the consent of his lord, William (I) d'Aubigny.



Matteo was probably a member of the Oldelli family living in Meride and Lugano in the Canton of Ticino in Switzerland, and at that time the pupil of a certain father Tommaso Cerroni or Cerrone, as some inscriptions in the volume - such as 'Mediolani apud Matth. Oldel.' (fol. 5/2r), 'Finis tractatus de sub.¹a die 3.° Mensis Julij. Mediolani apud Patrem Thomam Ceroneam' (fol. 5/2v), or "Matthaeus Oldellus scripsit sub Patre Thoma Ceroneo Mediolani" (fol. 29/9r) - suggest. We cannot prove with certainty the identities of this student or his teacher, but on some pages Oldelli has drawn the device of Jesus' Sacred Heart (e.g. fols. 3/4r, and 29/9v), a devotion which had been propagated by the Society of Jesus. This feature suggests the production of this manuscript was within the Jesuit academic milieu, and more likely, the Jesuit College in Milan.

Furthermore, the study of the Aristoteles Latinus was very relevant to the curriculum at Jesuit colleges and universities, as prescribed in the Constitution by the founder of the order, Ignatius of Loyola. Teachers had developed a well-ordered and clear system of exercises, in the form of disputationes, or disputed questions, a didactic tool which represents a veritable workhorse of Jesuit education. In this manuscript the texts under discussion are the Analytica priora and the Analytica posteriora, which contain the fundamental principles of Aristotle's logic, and had been widely disputed even into the 17th century. Each question deals with a basic principle - like the notions of predicaments, relation, or enunciation - and is introduced by Aristotle's text, or a summary of it. A detailed discussion follows.

The manuscript offered here shows how Aristotle's works were studied, as well as Jesuit methodology in philosophical teaching.



The poem opens with a long description of the inclemency of winter and its effects on nature. The unidentified author makes a metaphorical treatment of cold, winds ('froid aquilon, ministre des hyvers'), frost, and snow to describe human misery. Cold was traditionally associated with misery, and some of the images used here represent literary commonplaces. But the second and more lengthy part of the poem comments on social issues, dramatically narrating the pitiful condition of families living in poverty and hunger, in stark contrast to the opulence of Versailles, the Louvre, and other palaces, which had been built by hundreds of skilled but miserable workmen.

The novel was published in several editions but the first edition is scarce with only 8 copies listed on ESTC (2 in the BL), and the only copy traced at auction being as long ago as 1931.

A Nathaniel Hibbert, of Munden House, Herts., was the son-in-law of the author and wit Rev. Sydney Smith (1771-1845), a progressive clergyman who was one of the founders of the Edinburgh Review. Smith supported both the education of women and the abolition of slavery. Thomas George Fonnereau (1789-1850) was an English author and artist who inherited a substantial fortune and used the money to realise his ambition of constructing a "bachelor's kennel" with the assistance of his friend the architect Decimus Burton. He was related to the Hibbert family which later became the Holland-Hibbert family.

Charteris wrote *The Saint's Second Front* in or around the summer of 1941, the story centres around a plan for a surprise attack upon the United States by a Japanese clandestine army named the Black Dragon as a prelude to a larger invasion. He submitted it for publication with *Cosmopolitan* but was rejected on the grounds that "we do not think this is the time to publish anything which might aggravate the tensions with our Japanese friends."

Although referenced occasionally in interviews by Charteris, the story was ultimately feared to be lost when Charteris revealed he did not keep a copy himself after it was

feared to be lost when Charteris revealed he did not keep a copy himself after it was rejected (he later stated about the affair "perhaps I was lucky that time, after all. As a period piece, today, it might have seemed a bit silly") and an incident at Doubleday's warehouse storage which resulted in many of their pre-1950s manuscripts becoming lost or damaged. This therefore represents a unique opportunity to own the only known copy of what Charteris himself called "the only story I have falled to sell since I became what is called 'established'".

His first feature film, The House That Dripped Blood (1971), starring Christopher Lee and Peter Cushing, became a classic of the genre. He went on to write and direct an adaptation of Graham Greene's *England Made Me*, a film that Greene ranked as one of the best films based upon his work. Duffell was also Greene's choice to write and direct The Honorary Consul. Together they collaborated on the script, but in the event other interests intervened and to Greene's great dismay the film was made to another script by another director. However, the two men remained life-long friends.



 - b. to us, at our address set out in these Terms of Sale or at our registered office address appearing on our Website; and
 - a. to you, at the last postal address that you have given to us as your contact address in writing; or
 - 14.3.2 by email:
 - a. to us, at the following email addresses: info@forumauctions.co.uk and office@forumauctions.co.uk
 - b. to you, by sending the notice to any email address that you have given to us as your contact email address.
- 14.4 Notices will be deemed to have been received:
 - 14.4.1 if delivered by hand, on the day of delivery;
 - 14.4.2 if sent by first class pre-paid post or Recorded Delivery, two business days after posting, exclusive of the day of posting; or
 - 14.4.3 if sent by email, at the time of transmission unless sent after 17.00 in the place of receipt in which case they will be deemed to have been received on the next business day in the place of receipt (provided that a copy has also been sent by pre-paid post or Recorded Delivery).
- 14.5 Any notice or communication given under these Terms of Sale will not be validly given if sent by fax, email (unless also delivered Recorded Delivery), any form of messaging via social media or text message.

15. Data Protection

We will hold and process any personal data in relation to you in accordance with the principles underlying the Data Protection Act. Our registration number with the Information Commissioner is ZA178875.

16. Conditional Right to cancel following an Exclusively Online Auction only




