- 1. Introduction. The following notices are intended to assist buyers, particularly those that are new to our saleroom and internet bidding platforms. Our auctions are governed by our Terms and Conditions of Business incorporating the Terms of Consignment, the Terms of Sale supplemented by any notices that are displayed in our saleroom, the online catalogue listing or announced by the auctioneer at the auction. Our Terms and Conditions of Business are available for inspection at our saleroom and online at www.forumauctions.co.uk. Our staff will be happy to help you with any questions you may have regarding our Terms and Conditions of Business. Please make sure that you read our Terms of Sale set out in this catalogue and on our website carefully before bidding in the auction. In registering to bid with us you are committing to be bound by our Terms of Sale.
- Agency. As auctioneers we usually act on behalf of the seller whose identity, for reasons of confidentiality, is not normally disclosed. If you buy at auction your contract for the goods is with the seller, not with us as auctioneer.
- 3. Estimates. Estimates are intended to indicate the hammer price that a particular lot may achieve. The lower estimate may represent the reserve price (the minimum price for which a lot may be sold) and cannot be below the reserve price. Estimates do not include the buyer's premium, VAT or other taxes and fees (where chargeable). Estimates may be altered by a saleroom notice.
- 4. Buyer's Premium. The Terms of Sale oblige you to pay a buyer's premium on the hammer price of each lot purchased. All lots are offered under the Auctioneer's Margin Scheme and VAT (at 20%) is included within the buyer's premium. Austen family theatricals. In the winter of 1787, some of the younger members of the Austen family converted a barn at the rectory at Steventon in order to put on plays over the Christmas period. One of the guests that year was a cousin Eliza de Feuillide, god-daughter of Warren Hastings, and a wealthy woman who had sponsored a play, Hannah Cowley's Which is the Man? at Tunbridge Wells Theatre in September. They decided to stage Susannah Centlivre's, The Wonder! A Woman Keeps a Secret, with James Austen as producer, his younger brother Henry as leading man and Eliza, leading woman. After its success, they staged a second play in January, The Chances, and finally a third in March 1788, Henry Fielding's Tom Thumb, all with prologues and epilogues supplied by the eldest son James, considered the writer of the family. Jane Austen, even at such a young age would have been involved at some level in such literary fun, and from this date started writing herself. Jane Cooper acted opposite Henry Austen in two plays at Christmas 1788, and was almost certainly at Steventon for the festivities a year earlier. The wider circle of cousins to the Austens, including the Coopers, Leighs and Lefroys would have been familiar with such verses, perhaps sometimes read aloud in the parlour of the rectory at Steventon on a winter's evening in a candlelit room full of shadows. This manuscript collection of intimate songs and verses was compiled by a member of this wide cousinhood, and if not a member of the Cooper family, certainly someone very close to the Austen family.

With the initials "MC" on the clasp this was presumably Mary's bible, possibly given to her as a wedding present. Of the nine children listed four died either stillborn or prematurely.



& The Rye House plot was a conspiracy to kill King Charles II and his brother James, Duke of York, as they passed through Hertfordshire on the way back to London from the races at Newmarket. The conspirators were an extremist Whig group who were alarmed at the King's Catholic sympathies and the future succession of James who was known to be a Catholic. Anti-Catholic hysteria engulfed the country following the Popish Plot, instigating Parliament to introduce the Exclusion Bill in 1681 which would prevent James from succeeding Charles. The King dissolved Parliament to stop the Bill being passed precipitating many conspiracies such as this. In the end a fire at Newmarket caused the races to be cancelled so Charles and James returned to London early and the plotters missed their chance. Several notable figures were involved in the plot, many being executed like Lord Russell, imprisoned or exiled. Among those who fled to Holland was the Duke of Monmouth, Charles II's illegitimate son, who was himself beheaded following the Monmouth Rebellion of 1685, another attempt to overthrow James, by then James II.

Also tipped into the volume is a facsimile of *An Account of the Proceedings against the Rebels at an Assize holden at Exeter...* of 1685, listing several of those involved in the Monmouth Rebellion and their trial for treason.

The first is for the murder of Maria Bagnall or Brignall, companion to an elderly lady in Bath, found murdered in the kitchen of Marlborough Buildings on 26th January 1828. Gillam was the butler and claimed that robbers had entered the house and murdered her. He was 24 and hanged at Ilchester Gaol on 4th June 1828; his wife, the cook, gave birth to their daughter shortly before his execution.


Captain Tetley was first lieutenant under Captain Joseph Short on board HMS *Porpoise*, the ship that brought Governor William Bligh to Sydney in August 1806; following a disagreement with Captain Scott, Tetley eventually left Sydney in 1807.

Two other albums with duplicate examples of the watercolours found in the present Rashleigh album are known. Both are held in the Mitchell Library, New South Wales [see DGB 10 and PXB 513]. Of these two albums one bears the signature of George Charles Jenner, who was once thought to be the artist, but now more likely only a previous owner [PXB 513]. The Mitchell Library has



suggested that the watercolours in this set are the "originals", which were drawn from life at Botany Bay as stated on the inside back cover. As such the present album likely consists of contemporary duplicates, possibly by Tetley himself; a practice common at the time in order to produce a "fair copy" record. There are some minor differences between the sets that uphold this suggestion, including a total lack of under-drawing, but most notable is the addition of drapery covering the exposed genitalia of several of the Aborigines, which is found only in the Rashleigh copy.

& A FASCINATING AND CHARMING ALBUM COVERING THE EXTENSIVE VOYAGES OF A MID-19th CENTURY NAVAL OFFICER, comprehensively documenting both his encounters with remote indigenous communities, and the numerous locations that he travelled through.

The long tradition of naval survey and natural history sketches produced

by naval officers goes back to Cook's first voyage, and the practice appears to have been particularly prevalent on HMS Portland [for comparative drawings by John Linton Palmer, also on board HMS Portland with Lowther, see the Royal Geographical Society, J.L. Palmer, Album No. 4, F30/4, RGS-IBG Collections]. While on HMS Portland Lowther undertook numerous intimate studies of the people of the Marquesas Islands and Easter Islands, many of whom are adorned with tattoos and seen interacting with the ship's crew. While on Vancouver Island, Lowther drew "from nature" portraits of First Nation peoples, including Chief Cheealthluc "King Freezy", and "King George [...] of the Clallam Hathcad Indians", and the "Chief of Neah Bay, Strait Of Juan De Fuca".

Amongst the studies Lowther produced of daily life, there are a number of military events at which he was also present, with drawings of these in the album including: a bird's-eye plan of Maluda Bay, just before Admiral Thomas Cochrane destroyed a pirate fleet manned by 1000 freebooters, 1845; "The Grand Alligator Battle at Malacca", July 1845; the forts used during the Capture of Brunei, 1846; and a study of the sailing ship of the Imam of Muscat leaving Penang. The album also contains several other studies of sailing ships, including HMS Portland.

& One of the Earliest Printed Astronomical Texts, and one of the Rarest scientific incunables issued in Ferrara. Only ten copies of this edition are recorded in institutional libraries (four in Italy and two in the United States).

The famous astronomer and traveller from Genoa, Andalo de Nigro, succeeded Cecco d'Ascoli to the chair in Florence and, in about 1330, became Giovanni Boccaccio's teacher. Geoffrey Chaucer (who, some seventy years later, wrote the first work in English on a scientific instrument - the *Treatise on the Astrolabe* and was inspired by Boccaccio for his *Canterbury Tales*) may have known Andalo's *Opus astrolabii* through either the *Genealogiae*

Deorum, which first appeared in 1472 or the *De casibus virorum illustrium*, printed in 1474-1475. In the latter, Boccaccio calls Andalo a 'venerable' man, and compliments him on his vast knowledge of the stars, gained 'by direct vision' during his travels around the world. In 1314 Andalo had been appointed ambassador to the Emperor of Trebisonda (Trabzon), and Giovanni Battista Ramusio, in his preface to the *Viaggi di Messer Marco Polo* (which opens the second volume of his *Navigationi et viaggi* of 1559), identified Andalo, not the Pisan Rustichello, as the prisoner to whom Marco Polo had dictated his memoirs.

The *Opus astrolabii* was edited by the physician and astrologer Pietro Bono Avogario (d. 1506) who was active, as the colophon states, 'in foelici gymnasio ferrariensi', and it was printed by the Frenchman Jean Picard de Hamell who "is not known to have issued at Ferrara any book besides the Nigro" (BMC vi, 608).





A SPLENDID COPY OF THE SECOND EDITION OF THIS RARE WORK ON THE HISTORY OF RAVENNA, OWNED BY THE WELL-KNOWN BIBLIOPHILE FROM BELLUNO, ODORICO PILLONE (1503-1593). In 1580, Pillone famously commissioned the painter Cesare Vecellio (1521-1601) to decorate, with drawings or painted fore-edges, the bindings of 172 volumes preserved in his Villa Casteldardo in the Dolomites, in which he had established his *Studio*. Vecellio, a cousin and pupil of Titian who worked in his atelier until his death, thus decorated the fore-edges of the majority of Pillone's library, depicting characters and landscapes relating to the subject of each book. Vecellio is also famously the author of *Habiti antichi et moderni*, the well-known illustrated history of clothing, in which he mentions the library and other collections of the Pillone family, as well as the exquisite hospitality in their Villa.

The present example represents one of only 21 volumes that Vecellio adorned with drawings on the covers, and one of the very few with both decorated vellum covers and painted fore-edges.


In 1874, a Pillone descendant sold the entire collection to the English bibliophile Thomas Brooke for 20,000 lire. After the latter's death, Humphrey Brooke, the heir of the collection, entrusted the sale to Alan Keen, who compiled a catalogue of its contents (*The Venetian Library Collected at the Close of the Sixteenth Century by Doctor Odorico Pillone and the Sides and Edges Painted by Cesare Vecellio*, London 1951). The collection was then purchased in 1957 by the French bookseller Pierre Berès, who immediately put it on sale, publishing a catalogue with the help of Italian art historian Lionello Venturi. The collection, united until then, was thus dispersed.


A FINE COPY OF THE FIRST EDITION OF THE MOST IMPORTANT 16TH-CENTURY ITALIAN TREATISE ON DANCING, AND ONE OF THE MOST BEAUTIFUL DANCE BOOKS EVER PRODUCED. This copy is of the issue bearing Ziletti's device on the title. Born in Sermoneta, Fabrizio Caroso was a protégé of Felice Maria Orsini Caetani (d. 1596), Duchess of Sermoneta. He spent most of his life in Rome, where he was active as a dancer, 'inventore di scene', dance master, musician and composer. He was the last proponent of the Renaissance Italian dance style, opposing the French danse noble, which had begun to spread across Europe in the last decades of the 15th century. Caroso was not only a practicing dancer, but also a refined theorist, and this work, dedicated to Bianca Capello, provides a vast amount of detail about the dances of the period.

The first part illustrates 55 rules for steps, while the more lengthy second part describes 76 separate dances, including the *alta*, *bassa*, *balletto*, *pavan*, *cascarda*, *saltarello* and *spagnoletta*. Each dance is supplemented with a poem in praise of a different woman, mostly members of Roman noble families, and includes musical notation for the lute. Each of the dances under discussion is designed for one or more pairs of dancers. Throughout the work, Caroso celebrates the concept of 'nobil vivere', and the figure of the well-educated dancer- courtesan.

The 22 full-page copper engravings are executed by the renowned artist Giacomo Franco and depict the positions of dancers at the beginning of each of the various dances and cumulatively represent a precious iconographic source not only for the history of dance, but also for that of fashion and the culture of the period in general.

In 1854, at the outbreak of the Crimean War, Sir Oswald Walters Brierly (1817-1894), marine painter and naval engineer, joined Captain Henry Keppel as artist-observer on the man-of-war HMS *St John d'Acre* in the allied Baltic fleet; Brierley had previously accompanied Keppel on board HMS *Maeander* in the Pacific. The aim of this particular campaign was to bring Sweden into the war on the side of the allies, and also to pressure Russia to sue for peace over Sebastopol. Retained by the *Illustrated London News* to sketch the actions (reproduced from 25 March 1854), Brierly was one of the earliest naval war artists commissioned by a newspaper.

In 1855 he accompanied Keppel, in HMS *Rodney*, to the Black Sea and Sea of Azov; during this voyage he was often under enemy fire, and was subsequently awarded the Baltic and Crimean medals. His work illustrates the transition from the steam frigates of 1837 to the great steam fleet of 1854.





A DELUXE ILLUMINATED MANUSCRIPT OFFERED AS A GIFT BY THE ARETINE ABBOT AND HUMANIST GIROLAMO ALIOTTI TO POPE PIUS II PICCOLOMINI, PRODUCED IN THE FLORENTINE WORKSHOP RUN BY THE 'KING OF BOOKSELLERS' VESPASIANO DA BISTICCI and telling a fascinating tale of patronage. Girolamo Aliotti, a native of Arezzo and, from 1446, Prior of the Benedictine monastery of St. Flora and St. Lucilla, was a zealous self-promoter who regarded his literary production as a "monnaie d'échanges de faveurs" (C. Caby, Autoportrait d'un moine en humaniste, p. 298). He had become acquainted with the Sienese humanist Enea Silvio Piccolomini (1405-1464) in their early years of training at the Gymnasium where they also composed love poetry and prose. In 1442 Piccolomini was crowned poet laureate by Emperor Frederick III and he was elected pope in 1458 taking the name of Pius II, a reference to 'pious Aeneas', the hero of Virgil's epic: in this context, his phrase Aeneam suscipite, Pium recipite, i.e., 'Reject Aeneas, accept Pius' is well known. At the beginning of 1460, Aliotti learned that the Pope intended to sojourn in his home town of Siena and promptly set to writing the Gratulatio ad Pium II pro foelici, ac secundo ex Mantuana peregrinatione reditu. He also decided to commission, as a gift for his old friend, a luxurious manuscript containing this laudatory text along with two other works, his Dialogus de optimo vitae genere deligendo and the wellknown De monachis erudiendis. No expense was spared in preparing this manuscript for its illustrious recipient. From his maternal uncle, the wealthy wool merchant Paolo di Nanni Spadari, Aliotti had received a sum of money for a codex for a Pope. As attested by sources preserved at the Archivio Capitolare in Arezzo, and especially by Gabriele Maria Scarmagli's manuscript Synopsis Monumentorum SS. Florae et Lucillae, the transcription of texts and illumination were commissioned to none other than the Florentine cartolaio or bookseller Vespasiano da Bisticci (1421-1498), an established illuminator who counted among his clients kings, popes, cardinals, and bishops. The fee was paid on or before 2 January 1460 to Vespasiano "quando fece scrivere il Dialogo al papa, per la miniatura" (G. M. Scarmagli's Synopsis Monumentorum SS. Florae et Lucillae, p. 943), i.e. for the copying and illumination of the Dialogue commissioned as a gift to to Pope Pius II: this very manuscript, which scholars had for many years believed to be lost.

The manuscript is a complete work of art: the vellum used is of the highest quality; the script is extremely elegant and accurate; and the two papal crests, especially the larger one, held up by two winged putti (fol. 2/8r), were doubtless executed by one of the illuminators most closely associated with Vespasiano; they can possibly be attributed to Francesco di Antonio del Chierico (1433-1488) or his workshop, as suggested by the similar decorative elements and nuance in colour, handling and composition. Through Vespasiano da Bisticci, Francesco di Antonio del Chierico came to work for several princely patrons, including the Medici family, Federico da Montefeltro, Duke of Urbino, Louis XI, King of France, and Matthias Corvinus, King of Hungary. The manuscript opens with the *Gratulatio ad Pium II*, a conversation concerning





an especially pertinent topic of the time, and one of Pius II's highest priorities, the crusade against the Ottoman Turks, who had conquered Constantinople in 1453. Though the Pope's efforts ultimately failed, Aliotti's *Gratulatio* contains an unbounded defence of his old friend's intended crusade, and ends with a 78verse poem in praise of Piccolomini and his plea for Christian unity. The Gratulatio thus offers some of the earliest documentation of Western/Christian interest in modern Turkey, written by Aliotti just seven years after the fall of Constantinople. Until the discovery of this 'original' version, the text of Aliotti's Gratulatio had been dated a year later to 1461 and preserved in the National Library of Florence (cod. Magl. xxi.151). The other two works in the present manuscript - the *Dialogus de optimo vitae* genere deligendo and the De monachis erudiendis - are likewise part of Aliotti's strategy to ingratiate himself with Pope Piccolomini. Both were composed in the 1430s and were addressed by Aliotti to other patrons in order to win their favour; in 1460, each work was re-introduced by four dedicatory verses to Pius II, written on the verso of the preceding leaves.

* SUPERB ALBUM DEPICTING A GOOD CROSS-SECTION OF VENETIAN SOCIETY AT THE START OF THE 17TH CENTURY. The 22 fine, full-colour miniature drawings depict Italian costumes for men and women of different social ranks, scenes of local life, ceremonies, and characters from the Commedia dell'Arte. Twelve of these drawings depict Venetian scenes or dress, suggesting the album may have been executed in the Veneto region, particularly in Venice or Padua, leading centres not only for manuscript production and publication, but also for fashion and the trading of textiles.

In the age of pre-Grand Tour travels, albums such as this provided a sort of 'book of memories', illustrated with scenes from local life, especially its ceremonies and dress. These albums were thus produced according to a traveller's individual preferences, and the drawings were rarely signed by the artists. Notably, such travel albums, and particularly those produced in the Venetian milieu, often included representations of courtesans in addition to drawings of noble or wealthy women. Two such illustrations are of especial note. The first is a drawing of a woman dyeing her hair blond, an allurement closely associated with Venice, as attested by Titian's nudes. The second shows a courtesan, ironically juxtaposed with a widow, with a moveable flap for a skirt. This conceit derives from Bertelli's Diversarum nationum habitus, though the flap is lacking in many copies of the printed book. When the flap is lifted, the woman is seen to be essentially naked, wearing only a pair of stockings with fancy ribbons and some high-heeled shoes. The remaining miniatures show various figures in a seemingly arbitrary order, including some depicting figures from the Commedia dell'Arte. Developed in 16th-century Italy, the Commedia dell'Arte is a type of theatre characterised by improvised dialogues based around plot outlines and featuring a set of stock characters. Fol. 15 presents three of the most famous: Harlequin - the darling of the audience: witty, often impertinent, and full of jokes; he and Franquatripa - whose name signifies 'nonsense', and who's a real good-for-nothing - belong to the 'Zanni' or simple folk; and Isabella, most often the beautiful girl whose adventurous path to a happy

union with her beloved forms a central plotline. Closely related is the miniature entitled 'Charlatano' (fol. 18). Charlatans entertained with fantastic stories, often about illnesses and miraculous cures for which they held in stock a wide selection of 'medicine' on sale for the audience. Another aspect of the fascination with theatre and costume is illustrated by the masquerade (fol. 19), a popular pastime of the wealthy Venetians, which of course reached its annual peak at Carnival.

The miniatures in the second part of the album, among which the flagellants stand out, represent the other strata of society: a peasant woman and her male counterpart, a fisherman, two vineyard workers, and two servants at leisure. This last miniature shows the pair engaged in a round of mora, a popular Italian game and early version of 'spoof' in which two players simultaneously hold up one or several fingers, each player trying at the same time to predict the number of fingers shown by the other.

Similar albums are highly sought after by collectors for their rarity and the beauty of their visual representations. Famous examples include the ms Egerton 1191 of the British Library, which was produced in Venice or Padua in the 1570s, and the album known as *Mores Italiae*, held by the Beinecke Library (ms 457), which was executed in the 1570s for a foreign student matriculated at the University of Padua.


DIGBY'S PREMATURE CONGRATULATIONS TO THE EARL OF LEICESTER ON A PUTATIVE ANGLO-FRENCH TREATY. Robert Sidney, second Earl of Leicester (1595-1677), diplomat and landowner. In April 1636 Charles I sent Leicester as ambassador-extraordinary to Louis XIII of France, seconding the mission of the ambassador-in-ordinary, Viscount Scudamore, whose negotiations with the French had proved unsuccessful. Despite working hard for a projected Anglo-French agreement, other factors such as intrigues against Cardinal Richelieu, and secret talks with the exiled Marie de Medici, doomed the treaty from the start

Kenelm Digby, the elder son of Sir Everard Digby (c. 1578-1606), executed for his part in the Gunpowder Plot. Digby was a man of many parts, including, as a courtier (he was a friend of Charles I and was known to Cromwell), poet, traveller, book collector, author and inventor. In 1625 he married the beautiful Venetia Stanley, a childhood friend who he mourned extravagantly when she died in 1633 (Van Dyck made the death-mask for a deathbed portrait); he travelled extensively, fighting a naval action against Venetian galleys off Iskenderun, and living successively in France and Italy. One of Digby's main claims to fame were his chemical experiments, including the renowned Powder of Sympathy, made

THIS HIGHLY IMPORTANT ASSOCIATION COPY, RECEIVED BY FATIO, NEWTON'S CLOSE FRIEND AND COLLABORATOR, FIVE DAYS BEFORE NEWTON HIMSELF PRESENTED A COPY TO THE ROYAL SOCIETY. THE EARLIEST KNOWN PRESENTATION COPY OF THE ONLY BOOK NEWTON PREPARED FOR PUBLICATION AND SAW THROUGH THE PRESS HIMSELF.

Inscribed at the top of the front pastedown in Fatio's hand: 'Ex Dono Autoris Clarissimi: Londini, Februarii undecimo, 1703/4. Nicolaus Facius.' Fatio also used the Latin form of his name in an inscription recording presentation by Newton in his copy of the third edition of the *Principia* (1726).

The date of presentation is of particular interest. The *Opticks* builds on work that Newton carried out as early as the mid-1660s and later presented in his earliest lectures as Lucasian Professor

in Cambridge. His first publications in the journal of the Royal Society, the *Philosophical Transactions*, were on the nature of light. For much of the 1670s, he engaged in critical correspondence with English and Continental virtuosi about his findings. As he stated in the 'Advertisement' at the beginning of the published Opticks, he began to prepare a more complete work on light in about 1675. He returned to the idea of publishing this work only after the appearance of the Principia (which contained one section on optical mechanics) in 1687 had won him international fame. The manuscript was largely prepared in the period 1687-8 and 1691-2. The Scottish mathematician and Oxford Professor of Astronomy, David Gregory, saw an incomplete text when he visited Newton in Cambridge in May 1694. Newton delayed finishing the book, however, and decided to print it only in 1702 or 1703. The book was going through the press in December 1703. On 16 February 1704, Newton presented the completed book to the Royal Society, of which he had been President since 30 November 1703. The copy on offer was presented to Fatio five days earlier.

Nicolas Fatio de Duillier (1664-1753) was a Swiss mathematician and natural philosopher. Educated at the Academy of Geneva, Fatio worked with Giovanni Domenico Cassini at the Royal Observatory in Paris in the early 1680s. He first came to England in 1687 and became a Fellow of the Royal Society on 2 May 1688. After the Revolution of 1688, Fatio was the most important intermediary between Newton and Huygens. Fatio regarded himself (with some justification) as being among the very few



mathematicians internationally who were equipped to handle the new calculus and as being in the forefront of scientists who were trying to explain the action of gravity, the force which played such an important role in the physical explanations provided by the *Principia*. In the early 1690s, Fatio emerged as the likeliest person to produce a revised edition of the *Principia* and discussed corrections to the work with Newton, to whose manuscripts he also had access. At this time, he was one of Newton's closest confidants. The two men regularly exchanged letters (several of which remain unpublished) and Fatio advised Newton in particular about the purchase of alchemical works in French.

For much of 1693, Newton and Fatio collaborated on alchemical experiments, with Fatio conveying information derived from practitioners with whom he associated in the London Huguenot community. According to William R. Newman, who has recently produced a definitive account of the alchemical collaboration of Newton and Fatio, Newton was 'testing the ability of a vitriol to "ferment" respectively with salts of lead, tin, and copper' and fermenting iron, copper, and lead with metallic quicksilver. Exhaustion from long hours tending the furnace involved in these experiments may well have caused Newton's famous breakdown, which he discussed in letters to Samuel Pepys and John Locke in autumn 1693. Newman's work demonstrates that Fatio's involvement with Newton reflected shared intellectual concerns with 'chymistry, the transformation of materials, and the production of remedies.' These interests remained vital despite Newton's illness, which cannot now be attributed to any falling out with Fatio. Fatio found new employment as a tutor in 1694, which required him to be away from London; he travelled to the Netherlands with his pupil in 1697-8, and returned to Geneva between 1699 and 1701. Nevertheless, he remained a regular participant in conversations among Newton and his disciples: his interest in the renewed editing of the Principia and in Newton's other projects was taken for granted.

In London in 1698, Fatio set to work seeing two compositions of his own through the press: an English treatise on the exploitation of the angle of the sun's rays in gardening (*Fruit Walls Improved*) and a Latin pamphlet on the geometrical investigation of the line of quickest descent (*Lineae brevissimi descensus*), a work notable for its author's attempt to reassert a position among the front rank of European mathematicians. As such Fatio was critical of the behaviour of Johann Bernoulli and his associates for the nature of the challenge problem which they had issued in 1696, and which Newton had answered with a correct solution for the line of quickest descent. Newton had presented his work anonymously in the *Philosophical Transactions* (January 1697), but gave no hint about the method he had followed. He presented a construction of the solution-curve (a cycloid).

Behind Bernoulli's challenge lurked Gottfried Wilhelm Leibniz, whom Fatio accused of having ignored Newton's priority in the invention of the calculus in his publications about this mathematical tool. At the heart of the dispute lay a broader intellectual problem that many Continental mathematicians had in accepting Newton's subordination of his method of fluxions to traditional geometrical arguments and their consequent belief that Newton had not properly mastered the intricacies of the new analysis that Leibniz had developed. On such a reading, no other mathematician in England except Newton was worthy of consideration (Fatio included). Fatio's pamphlet also treated the problem of the solid of least resistance, which Newton had solved in Book II of the *Principia* (1687). He wished to show that, since Newton had solved the problem of the solid of least resistance in 1687, he could equally well solve the problem (belonging to the same class) of the line of quickest descent nine years later. Mathematically speaking the two problems are similar: if you know how to solve one, then you are likely to know how to solve the other. Fatio's work therefore set out to suggest that, since he and Newton had known one another and shared mathematical work since 1687, he too rightfully belonged among the sharpest mathematicians of Europe.



Fatio's publication put the cat among the pigeons and is properly considered the opening salvo in a decade and a half of philosophical warfare between Newton and Leibniz. Although Leibniz and Johann Bernoulli were critical of Fatio's own solutions to the problem of the line of quickest descent, other leading mathematicians such as Jakob Bernoulli or Jakob Hermann were far more circumspect. They were particularly interested in the explanation of the mechanism of gravity that Fatio shared with them as part of his exchanges at this time. Fatio had presented these ideas to the Royal Society as early as July 1688, but they remained topical as Continental mathematicians and philosophers struggled to interpret the Principia. In this way, Fatio's pamphlet succeeded in reclaiming attention for his own scientific ideas, as well as going into the lists for Newton's reputation. It also showed that he could handle the most difficult problems in mathematics.

By the time of his return from Switzerland in 1701, Fatio was therefore a significant player in an international debate about the nature of the calculus and about the way in which physical effects might be transmitted so as to appear to cause action at a distance. These were also concerns looked at in the Opticks, initially in the two mathematical tracts appended by Newton to the work, and later also in the queries that were developed from Newton's theory of light in the revisions made to the Latin translation (Optice) of 1706. At the same time, Fatio re-established himself as a contact between Newton and skilled craftsmen in the London Huguenot community, as is shown by exchanges between the two men in the year of publication of the Opticks. These concerned the design of watches with a jewelled mechanism, which Newton eventually tested for accuracy in December 1704. Finally, Newton was in Fatio's debt as the recipient of a presentation copy of Fatio's own publication of 1699. It is not surprising therefore to find that Fatio was one of the very first recipients of a presentation copy of the Opticks on 11 February 1704.

Newton's gift of the *Opticks* to Fatio and the close reading implied by Fatio's annotations formed part of a broader pattern of gift-giving. Halley presented Fatio with a copy of the first edition of the *Principia* in 1687 (now Bodleian Library, Oxford, shelfmark Arch. A d.37). Fatio reciprocated by presenting his own book to both Newton and Halley. Newton responded with a copy of the *Opticks*.

Fatio was an attentive enough reader of the mathematical treatises appended to the book to make a small number of accurate corrections which were not in the errata. The mathematical tracts appended to the *Opticks* included some of Newton's most profound analysis of the quadrature of curves and of cubic curves, the culmination of work that he had begun in the mid-1660s and perfected in the mid-1690s. As such they had direct relevance to the growing public quarrel into which Fatio had pitched Newton. Fatio discussed the content of the *Opticks* with his correspondents on the Continent, although only after the latter had been able to read the work in Latin. His ongoing interest in solar light and 'crowns of coulours wch sometimes appear about the Sun & Moon' was the subject of a letter that Newton sent to Fatio on 14 September 1724, offering to communicate his ideas to the Royal Society.

Fatio's copy of the Opticks is largely invisible in scholarship, although its possible existence is mentioned in Charles Domson's thesis 'Nicolas Fatio de Duillier and the Prophets of London' (Yale University, 1972: p. 84). Fatio died in Worcester, where he had lived since 1717, in April 1753. Half of his effects passed to Corfield Clare (d.1790), rector of Madresfield and of Alvechurch, with whom he had lodged. The other half were bequeathed to the widow of Jean Allut, who was, like Fatio, a disciple of the enthusiastic Camisard prophets who had come to England in 1706. In April 1765, the Genevan natural philosopher George-Louis Le Sage purchased for £8 some of the papers that had been left to Clare. What remained in Worcestershire was acquired by the physician and antiquary James Johnstone (c. 1730-1802). His son, John Johnstone (1768-1836), who practised medicine in Worcester from 1793, later inherited the Opticks (and made a note of its acquisition by his father on the front free endpaper). He also owned other books and papers that had belonged to Fatio (most of which are now impossible to locate). John Johnstone became a Fellow of the Royal Society in 1815 and subsequently donated Fatio's notes on the revision of the Principia to the Society's library. Two books from Fatio's library (copies of the first and the third edition of the *Principia*) survive in the Bodleian Library, Oxford, but they had presumably been sold by either Clare or Mrs Allut immediately after Fatio's death, since they were acquired from an Oxford bookseller in 1755. The Bodleian also owns a copy of Some Manifestations and Communications of the Spirit (London, 1730), a work associated with the French Prophets, which has annotations made by Fatio in Worcester in 1731. This book belonged shortly after Fatio's death to Sir John Van Hatten of Dinton Hall, Buckinghamshire, but in the twentieth century had an American owner before being purchased by the Bodleian. The Opticks has no direct sign of provenance after John Johnstone. It does bear one or two booksellers' marks and a price (£250/0/0) indicating that it was sold in England before 1971.


The print-run of the first edition of the *Opticks* is unknown. From the later records in the Bowyer ledgers for other books by Newton (including the second edition of the Opticks), it seems fair to assume an edition size of between 750 and 1,000 copies. The Babson catalogue lists 35 institutional copies of the first edition of the Opticks. Wallis lists 59 with a further two (one among the Babson copies) for a supposed second issue of the Opticks from which the mathematical treatises are lacking. ESTC gives 129 institutional holdings (two of which are in fact duplicated), without differentiating the two issues. With the use of additional databases and the consultation of individual online catalogues to confirm the status of particular copies, it is straightforward to identify at least 185 surviving copies, together with one copy (from those identified by Wallis) that was destroyed in the Second World War. Of these 185 copies, it has been possible to establish provenance data and descriptions of condition for approximately thirty-five for the purposes of comparison.


Most of these copies are bound in Cambridge-style panelled calf with blind fleurons on the boards. This may reliably be assumed to have been a publisher's binding, although the spine decoration may not always have been standard (many copies have been rebacked or otherwise altered). That said, copies in unrestored, original condition (such as Edmond Halley's copy, John Locke's copy, or the copy in the Old Library of Magdalene College, Cambridge) have identical decoration, tooling, and lettering on boards, spine, and (where present) red morocco spine label (gilt lettering: NEWTON'S | OPTICKS | &c). Very few surviving copies have extensive contemporary annotations: exceptions include the copies that belonged to Newton himself (Cambridge University Library, shelfmark Adv.b.39.4, used to prepare the second edition of 1717 [lacking title-page and all after p. 137 in Book III]; Trinity College, Cambridge, shelfmark NQ.16.198 [lacking pp. 1-17 and the mathematical treatises] and McGill University Library, Montreal, MS 46 [shelfmark QC353,.N57.1704]) or the copy in the Boston Public Library (with contemporary corrections and additions not in Newton's hand, giving crossreferences to the work of his Cambridge successor, William Whiston). There are a number of copies with annotations from the later eighteenth or nineteenth centuries (e.g. that at the Senate House Library, London, with the annotations of the mathematician and biographer of Newton, Augustus De Morgan).

There are also a number of copies that can be identified with provenance at or near to the date of publication. Among these is a copy bought by Francis Cremer [presumably of Ingoldisthorpe, Norfolk (d. 1759)] for 12s. in 1704, and one of the copies formerly at the Babson Institute (now on deposit in the Huntington Library, San Marino, California), which has a manuscript price code with the date 1704. Leibniz's copy (Gottfried-Wilhelm-Leibniz Bibliothek, Hannover) was sent to him from London by John Hutton on 2 May (13 May NS) 1704 and received in Hannover via The Hague before 22 July (NS). The Opticks was published after the death of Samuel Pepys in 1703, but a copy entered his library during the period in which it was being curated by his nephew, John Jackson (before 1705). The French physician, Etienne François Geoffroy, received a copy (now in Cornell University Library), from Hans Sloane (Secretary to the Royal Society) via the Jesuit mathematician, Jean de Fontenay. Fontenay had visited London, where he presented Chinese artefacts to the Royal Society in March 1704. Geoffroy thanked Sloane for the gift in a letter of 20 January 1706 (NS) and presented a summary of the book's contents to the Académie Royale des Sciences in a series of sessions between 7 August 1706 and 1 June 1707. The first copy that can be traced as arriving in North America was given by James Peirce to the Library of Harvard College on 30 March 1706 (now in the Houghton Library).

More interesting still are copies presented to their first owners by Newton himself (none of which bear inscriptions in Newton's own hand). These include:

- 1. The copy now in the library of the Royal Society, presented at a meeting of the Society on 16 February 1704.
- 2. The copy presented by Newton to Francis Hall '[th]e beginning of March 1703' [= 1704 NS]. Since no later than 1828, this has been held by the library of the University of Virginia at Charlottesville.
- 3. The copy presented to Edmond Halley (lot 918, Robert S. Pirie sale, Sotheby's New York 2015). This is inscribed by Halley 'Luceo' and (perhaps not in Halley's hand) 'Ex dono doctissimi Authoris'. It is in a similar binding to the copy on offer here, but with the red morocco label present. It measures 24.5cm x 16.6cm, so is marginally taller (but less wide) that Fatio's copy.





4. The copy given by Newton to John Locke (died 28 October 1704), now in the library of Trinity College, Cambridge. It is inscribed by Locke: 'Ex dono Auctoris | Viri Doctissimi. Intigerrimi Amicissimi' and was given to Trinity in 1895. The first of the corrections in the errata is made in ink; Rr1v and Rr4r are poorly printed. It is in a similar binding to the copy on offer here, but with the red morocco label present. It is slightly taller and wider than Fatio's copy, suggesting that despite the similarities in binding there were distinctions made by the binder between larger and ordinary, smaller copies for presentation.

5. The copy (now lost) that Newton sent to the Pisan mathematician, Guido Grandi (1671-1742), accompanied by a letter dated 26 May 1704. This copy cannot be located among Grandi's books in the manuscript catalogue of his library prepared in 1769, and precise details about it are therefore unknown. The library has been part of the Biblioteca Universitaria of Pisa since 1783. A copy of the 1706 *Optice* may be found there.

6. The copy offered at Christie's New York on 16 June 2016 (lot 131), which bears the inscription 'Ex dono Authoris Mathematicorum Coryphaei, 1703/4'.

Many of Fatio's annotations deal with errors already described on the errata page of the Opticks (where Fatio notes that he has corrected these errata in the text: "Haec Errata correcta sunt'). Most are in ink, some are in pencil. The pencil corrections, which are confined to De Quadratura, are all found in the 1711 edition of Newton's mathematical tracts and were presumably added after that date. The ink corrections are more likely to have been made shortly after Fatio was given the book, although some of them may have been incorporated from the 1706 Latin Optice, in which they also appear. There is no evidence of any communication between Newton and Fatio in the making of these corrections. The only one of Newton's copies of the Opticks to contain the mathematical tracts is now at McGill University. It contains only one of the corrections made by Fatio in pencil, but it also contains many other corrections and additions incorporated either in the 1706 Optice or in the 1711 mathematical tracts which are not in Fatio's copy of the Opticks.


The errata are mostly corrected in the main body of the text in all three of Newton's copies of the *Opticks*. In the copy at Trinity College, these corrections are frequently not in Newton's hand, suggesting that they were made already in the printing shop. In Fatio's copy, occasional items in the errata have not been corrected in the text (e.g. the corrections for pp. 86, 93, and one of those for p. 143 in book I, pp. 11 (in fact, a mistake in the errata); pp. 96, 101 (where the wrong number is corrected by Fatio) in book II). Despite such slips, the annotations show Fatio as an attentive and mathematically literate reader of the *Opticks*.

This copy is the earliest witness to the publication of the *Opticks* and a valuable testament to the ongoing friendship and intellectual exchange between Newton and Nicolas Fatio de Duillier, a very significant figure in his own right and the first mover in the public calculus controversy. It is one of only four books known from Fatio's library and is undoubtedly the most significant book that could emerge that he owned. It is a more interestingly annotated copy of the Opticks than any of the other surviving presentation copies (including that given to Halley) or than most of the other copies (apart from Newton's own) with contemporary annotations and provenance. Of known presentation copies that cannot now be located, Grandi's would not compare with Fatio's for interest or significance, Other copies that might be presumed to have existed include that of John Flamsteed (acquired by November 1704, but unknown apart from references in correspondence) and that of David Gregory. Because the book was in English, most important Continental contemporaries of Newton (such as the Bernoullis) did not acquire it until after the publication of the Latin Optice in 1706. None of these copies, were they to come onto the market, would surpass Fatio's unless they were very heavily annotated with original material. Moreover, Fatio's copy is in good, original condition and compares very well in this respect with any other copy that is available or likely to become available.


The first volume contains King's account of the expedition in the Adventure made between 1826 and 1830, which surveyed the coasts of Patagonia and Tierra del Fuego. The second volume (and its appendix volume) describes the narrative of the Beagle's second voyage under Capt. Fitzroy made between 1831 and 1836 to South America, the Galapagos Islands, Tahiti, New Zealand, Australia, and other islands and countries. The five years of the voyage were the most important event in Darwin's intellectual life and in the history of biological science. Darwin sailed with no formal scientific training. He returned a hard-headed man of science, knowing the importance of evidence, almost convinced that species had not always been as they were since the creation but had undergone change... The experiences of his five years... and what they led to, built up into a process of epoch-making importance in the history of thought' (DSB).

He was Admiralty surgeon and agent to the Eastbourne division of the coastguard. Darwin had made his acquaintance in the autumn of 1860 when he and his family had spent seven weeks in nearby Marine Parade. Colgate's Name is included in the presentation list drawn up by Darwin for the third edition, issued in April, 1861. He wrote to thank Darwin for this gift on 25th June, 1861 (Darwin Correspondence, letter 3197), explaining that he had delayed writing until he heard back from his friend John Cowell Boys (a Sussex-born surveyor and sheep breeder who had emigrated to New Zealand), of whom Darwin had asked a series of detailed questions via Colgate on the population of bees in New Zealand. Colgate goes on to highlight 'a slight error at p.77' of the Origin, pointing out that owls and hawks were in fact the main predators of field mice, not cats. Darwin did not amend this page in subsequent editions.

The third edition 'was extensively altered, and is of interest for the addition of a table of differences between it and the second edition, a table which occurs in each subsequent edition, and also for the addition of the historical sketch... which was written to satisfy complaints that Darwin had not sufficiently considered his predecessors in the general theory of evolution... there is also a postscript on page xii... concern[ing] a review of the earlier editions by Asa Gray' (Freeman p. 78)


* A MILESTONE IN THE HISTORY OF ARCHITECTURE: the first edition of the *Quattro Libri dell'Architettura* by the Paduan theorist and practising architect Andrea di Pietro della Gondola, universally known as Andrea Palladio, after the name given to him by his patron and renowned humanist Giangiorgio Trissino. Palladio was primarily active as an architect in Venice, Vicenza, and along the Brenta river, where he built magnificent villas for wealthy members of the Venetian patriciate. This authoritative and influential treatise

celebrates the purity and simplicity of classical architecture, drawing its inspiration from Roman sources, especially Vitruvius, and Italian Renaissance architects, above all Leon Battista Alberti. The work is divided into four parts or libri, devoted to orders and elementary problems, domestic buildings, public buildings, and town planning and temples. "Palladio followed the rules of classical Roman architecture more closely than any other architect, even sometimes at the cost of practicability and domestic comfort. In spite of the vogue for the baroque and the fact that Palladio left no immediate successors, his book exerted a powerful influence on contemporary architecture and classical ideals until the end of the eighteenth century [...] 'Palladianism' became a party label in the world of connoisseurship and England blossomed with buildings 'in the Palladian style' - two centuries after Palladio had created it. From England the style made its way into Scotland, Ireland and America" (PMM). The treatise was reprinted and translated many times over the following centuries.

Within the splendid series of woodcuts which accompany the text, especially noteworthy are those in the second *libro* depicting plans and elevations of villas, including the famous Villa Maser built for Palladio's patron Daniello Barbaro.

Louise Thomas (1810-1911), of Eyhorne House, Hollingbourne, Kent married Richard Thomas around 1840. They had five daughters and a son, and from several references to Mary in the text this album was a gift for her fourth child, born in 1847. The Victoria and Albert Museum contains a very similar album by Lady Strange bound in red velvet so she presumably produced one for each of the Thomas daughters. 

Alberto Sangorksi was the elder brother of Francis Sangorksi who established the famous bookbinding firm with partner George Sutcliffe. He worked for Sangorksi & Sutcliffe, who became known for their jewelled bindings, and also for Rivière & Son from 1910. He produced for both many such highly-decorated illuminated manuscripts, the most famous of which, "the Great Omar", was lost when the *Titanic* sank in 1912.

The second voyage contains important information on Eskimo life, and the third voyage collected additional scientific information about the Arctic region of North America. On the fourth voyage Parry unsuccessfully tried using reindeer rather than dogs to pull his sledge-boats, but they proved too heavy to manoeuvre across the ice.
