The subjects covered in the 300 titles listed in this catalogue cover an impressively wide range of interests – horsemanship, duelling and mountaineering; botany, horticulture and ornithology; sermons and proclamations; jurisprudence and military history; psalms and poetry and maps. Don Quixote is there and so is Robinson Crusoe. A first edition of A Christmas Carol and plays by one W. Shakespeare. There is even a timely sermon 'for preserving these kingdoms from the plague' written by Englishman Samuel Towers after the Great Plague of Marseilles which raged from 1720-22 and claimed some 100,000 lives.

Many of these splendid books come from the library of Matthew Holbeche Bloxam, who attended Rugby School from 1813 to 1821. He became an amateur historian, a genealogist, archaeologist, naturalist, antiquarian, art-collector, a noted architectural historian. He was clearly a man of huge intellectual curiosity. He was also very generous, bequeathing a large part of his collection - of paintings, ancient weaponry, armour, pottery as well as books - to Rugby School.

The decision by Rugby School's Governing Body to sell these rare books is twofold. They deserve to be preserved, stored - and enjoyed - in specialist conditions. Secondly, the School is committed, as a registered charity, to use its resources to benefit current and future students. Rugby School already operates a generous bursary system, with more than 40% of our students receiving some form of scholarship remission or bursary support. In addition, our Arnold Foundation fully funds places for talented children who would benefit from a boarding education, but are without the means to fund it.

Between the covers of these extraordinary books are examples of creative expression, tales of adventure and skill, passages of learning, reflection, and wonder at the world, written by men and women of enquiring minds.

It is entirely fitting that the proceeds from the sale of this collection will go towards extending the benefit of a Rugby education, an education where boys and girls are encouraged to keep asking questions and challenging the answers.

His war poems are recordings of remembered His war poems are recordings of remembered experience, written <u>after</u> 1918. No other poet has produced such a detailed record of the Western Front, or anything like it. He observed with the accuracy of a naturalist & felt his experience profoundly. But his voice is a quiet one, & his literary art is unobtrusive, though masterly in technique. The strange thing is that not one of the literary professors has yet had the wit to draw attention to his unique achievement as a war poet. Anyhow, you can get his Collected Poems 5 judge for yourself. I am not qualified to enlighten you about the 1939-45 war poets. Those I have read are subjective & symbolistic & obscure. (Sidney Keyes was a genius, killed at 21.)

 - 6.1.2 pay to us within 3 working days the Total Amount Due in any way that we agree to accept payment or in cash (for which there is an aggregate upper limit of 10,000 euros for all purchases made in any auction).
- 6.2 If you owe us any money, we may use any payment made by you to repay prior debts before applying such monies towards your purchase of the Lot(s).

- 14.4 Notices will be deemed to have been received:
 - 14.4.1 if delivered by hand, on the day of delivery;
 - 14.4.2 if sent by first class pre-paid post or Recorded Delivery, two business days after posting, exclusive of the day of posting; or
 - 14.4.3 if sent by email, at the time of transmission unless sent after 17.00 in the place of receipt in which case they will be deemed to have been received on the next business day in the place of receipt (provided that a copy has also been sent by pre-paid post or Recorded Delivery).
- 14.5 Any notice or communication given under these Terms of Sale will not be validly given if sent by fax, email (unless also delivered Recorded Delivery), any form of messaging via social media or text message.
