- 1. Introduction. The following notices are intended to assist buyers, particularly those that are new to our saleroom and internet bidding platforms. Our auctions are governed by our Terms and Conditions of Business incorporating the Terms of Consignment, the Terms of Sale supplemented by any notices that are displayed in our saleroom, the online catalogue listing or announced by the auctioneer at the auction. Our Terms and Conditions of Business are available for inspection at our saleroom and online at www.forumauctions.co.uk. Our staff will be happy to help you with any questions you may have regarding our Terms and Conditions of Business. Please make sure that you read our Terms of Sale set out in this catalogue and on our website carefully before bidding in the auction. In registering to bid with us you are committing to be bound by our Terms of Sale.
- Agency. As auctioneers we usually act on behalf of the seller whose identity, for reasons of confidentiality, is not normally disclosed. If you buy at auction your contract for the goods is with the seller, not with us as auctioneer.
- 3. Estimates. Estimates are intended to indicate the hammer price that a particular lot may achieve. The lower estimate may represent the reserve price (the minimum price for which a lot may be sold) and cannot be below the reserve price. Estimates do not include the buyer's premium, VAT or other taxes and fees (where chargeable). Estimates may be altered by a saleroom notice.
- 4. Buyer's Premium. The Terms of Sale oblige you to pay a buyer's premium on the hammer price of each lot purchased. All lots are offered under the Auctioneer's Margin Scheme and VAT (at 20%) is included within the buyer's premium. Our rate of buyer's premium is 30% of the first £300,000 of the hammer price, reducing to 24% of the hammer price from £300,001 to £5,000,000 and then 15% of the hammer price in excess of £5,000,000. Buyers wishing to purchase lots outside the margin scheme must notify us and will be subject to VAT (currently at 20%) on the hammer price in addition to buyer's premium (and other applicable charges) which may be reclaimed as input VAT or in the event of export outside the EU.

We are happy to make the submission of necessary applications on behalf of our buyers but we will charge for this service only to cover the costs of our time.
- 8. Bidding. Bidders will be required to register with us before bidding. Purchases will be invoiced to the buyer's registered name and address only. When first registering for an account with us you will need to provide us with proof of your identity in a form acceptable to us. - **9.** Commission bidding. You may leave commission bids with us indicating the maximum amount (excluding the buyer's premium and/or any applicable VAT, fees or other taxes) you authorise us to bid on your behalf for a lot. We will execute commission bids at the lowest price possible having regard only to the reserve and other competing bids on the lot. Please note that we accept commission bids at standard bidding increments and reserve the right to reduce an off-increment bid down to the next lowest bidding increment or otherwise at our sole discretion.
- **10. Live online bidding.** When using our BidFORUM platform to participate in the auction through your account on our website there will be no additional charges. If you are using a third party live bidding platform then additional fees may be applicable. We will invoice these to you as an additional service and any applicable VAT will be separated out.
- 11. Methods of Payment. We accept payments only in the currency in which the invoice is issued and payment is due within 3 working days of the auction. 





It is one of only a handful of publications from this second Greek press in Rome. The text was meticulously edited by Janus Lascaris (c.1445-97), director



of the Greek Gymnasium, which was established on the Quirinal Hill in 1513 under the auspices of Pope Leo X. The edition is based on an authoritative manuscript now preserved in the Biblioteca Laurenziana in Florence (*Laur.* 32,9), which was acquired by Giovanni Aurispa in Constantinople in 1423.

The first Estienne Greek New Testament with an attractive provenance. It is the first book printed in Claude Garamond's second and smallest 'grecs du roi'. Estienne established his text by comparing the Complutensian and Erasmian printed editions with several manuscripts. 'The first Estienne Greek Testament and the second of 1549...are commonly known as the "O mirificam" editions, from the opening words of Robert's preface to François I, praising him for commissioning the second Greek font in order to provide Greek texts in pocket format' (Schreiber). Our copy bearing a note on title by Conrad Peutinger recording the volume as a gift from Johannes Rana. Peutinger (1465-1547) German humanist, book collector, correspondent of Erasmus, diplomat, politician and economist.

& Pierre Franco, creator of the suprapubic lithotomy cataract operation and the surgical repair of hernia, is considered to be one of the greatest surgeons of the Renaissance and a forerunner of urology. This work is absent from many major medical collections which regard the expanded second edition of 1561 as the first, yet this edition includes the first recorded description of an operation for strangulated hernia, and so marks itself as a milestone in Renaissance surgical practice. Franco was hugely influential by lauding open operations, and wanted to return them to the realm of regular surgical practice, rather than allowing itinerant practitioners known as 'inciseurs' or 'cutters' to attempt untrained procedures. The treatment of cleft lips amounts to four chapters, in which he recommends that after two days the eschar must be loosened with fresh butter before suturing. Franco also describes in minute detail the technique of radical operation for inguinal hernia. Like all who preceded him after the time of Celsus (except William of Salicet), he would remove the testicle as part of the usual procedure. Yet for patients with one testis he later devised an operation in which the organ was spared, and this life-saving procedure became part of the surgical armamentarium.

Though a contemporary of Ambroise Paré, Franco is often neglected from the medical history canon, yet Paré's first book, his Dix Livres de Chirurgie, 1564, plagiarises much of Franco's work on lithotomy and cystostomy, which Paré only later acknowledged in 1575. No other copies listed on ABPC/RBH, and we know



Regiomontanus's monumental work on triangles was the first printed systematization of the subject as a branch of mathematics independent of astronomy, and contains the earliest statement of the cosine law for spherical triangles, stating the proportionality of the sides of a plane triangle to the sines of the opposite angle. This fundamental proposition of spherical trigonometry appears as theorem 2 in book V of the treatise. In the second part, Regiomontanus proves the errors of Nicolaus de Cusa's theory of squaring the circle, which had a profound effect on the history of navigation (Adams). His contributions were instrumental in the development of Copernican heliocentrism in the decades following his death.



An exceptional set of the Greek portion of the first complete edition of Plutarch's works, edited by Henri Estienne "avec correction et elegance" (Renouard), and once owned by the outstanding Italian poet and patriot Ugo Foscolo. Foscolo's interest in the 'divine Plutarchus' was exemplified in his famous epistolary novel Le ultime lettere di Jacopo Ortis, in which Plutarch's works are the beloved reading of the main character.

Foscolo began to write the Discorsi sopra gli uomini illustri di Plutarco at the beginning of the nineteenth century, but only the Proemio or Preface, dated 1 January 1801, was completed. His library was bought by his friend Quirina Mocenni Magiotti in 1816, when Foscolo decided on a self-imposed exile in London, and later it mostly came into the possession of the Biblioteca Marucelliana in Florence.





The first published account of the illumination and projection of images appeared in this first edition. The work also includes some of the earliest observations with a microscope, preceding those of Hooke and van Leeuwenhoek by two decades.

The complete series of four educational playing card sets commissioned by Cardinal Mazarin for the instruction of Louis XIV, who ascended to the throne in 1643 under the regency of his mother. They were prepared by Jean Desmarests, a member of the French Academy, and first printed in 1644 under the Paris imprint of Henri Le Gras and Florentin Lambert. After Lambert's death the plates were sold to Florent le Comte who added suit-marks of spades, clubs, hearts, and diamonds, and reprinted them in book form in 1698. It is curious that in this copy the imprint "F. Le Conte" [sic] occurs on the engraved title leaf for the Mythology series but the three other series of playing cards still retain the original "Henri le Gras" imprint [from 1644).

The Kings begin with Pharamond and Clodion and end with young Louis (King of Hearts); in some instances, as many as five kings of France are featured on one card, each numbered and listing the length of his reign. The Queens begin with Martesie, queen of the Amazons, and end with Anne of Austria, the mother of King Louis - a single adjective is given at the upper right corner describing each one: pious, cruel, unfortunate, saintly, wise, brave, etc. Geography has a title card showing a twin-hemisphere map and the cards themselves comprise emblems of individual countries (divided into four sections, each a different continent): the Americas are represented by Peru, Mexico, Canada [Nouvelle France], Virginia, Florida, Yucatan, Nicaragua, Quivira [in Wichita, Kansas], Chile, Brazil, Popaian [Columbia], and Castile d'or [i.e. Panama]. Mythology ("jeu des fables") represent the Greek myths, including the stories of the nine Muses, Mercury, Neptune, Pygmalion, Hercules, Jason, Apollo, Narcissus, and Medusa.

"They are all extremely interesting and of much rarity, and from an artistic standpoint are of value as the work of the famous Florentine engraver Stefano della Bella" (Hargrave, *History of Playing Cards*, pp. 58-59).

The writer then explains that after the Emperor's death a scuffle took place among his attendants over the ruler's most treasured posessions, this being a prominent feature, which resulted in the first two "siparahs" being separated from the rest of the scroll.



She came to court as a chamberer in 1543 when she was about fifteen and had been promoted to gentlewoman of the queen's chamber at a salary of five shillings by 1547. Mary remained with Katherine Parr after Henry VIII's death. It was noted that sometimes she shared a bed with Parr for warmth. IN THE HOUSEHOLD OF KATHERINE PARR SHE WOULD HAVE BEEN IN DAILY CONTACT WITH THE FUTURE QUEEN ELIZABETH. In June 1550, Mary married David Seymour, a distant relation of Lord Protector Edward Seymour, duke of Somerset, who had also been in Queen Katherine's household. They had three children, William, Edward, and Anne, the last marrying Francis Nicolls.



The context of the above letter to Lonsdale was that William Whewell, President of the Geological Society, gave an address in February 1839 in which he expressed disappointment that the publication of Darwin's *Voyage of the Beagle* was being delayed due to the navy's rules. Darwin wrote to Whewell asking him to tone down his criticism of the navy and Captain Fitzroy. At the same time Darwin wrote the above letter to William Lonsdale, assistant librarian at the Geological Society, asking him to change Whewell's reference to the "rules" of the navy to "customs" in the published address.



In Burma, Forlong -Gordon joins his brother in Prome as a trainee surveyor, Major General James Forlong, road engineer and later Chief Engineer to the Governor of Oudh. On the way he mentions the devastation caused by the second Burmese War and proves a perceptive observer, on tobacco production, the manner in which the natives use teak forests, the death of Captain Matagan, "killed by a band of armed Burmese... held him down while the others wounded him in 22 places", roads collapsing, difficulty of sleeping at night due to the rain and "the howling of tigers & wild elephants", visits Rangoon before leaving for India.

He was an eccentric and irascible man, a brilliant huntsman, talented watercolourist, and early collector of impressionist pictures. In the words of his son Sir Timothy: '...he was induced neither by poverty nor obscurity of birth, nor by timidity - for he was physically and morally fearless - nor by the



slightest vestige of self-discipline, to restrain the exuberance of his feelings. Nature had showered upon him with an uncontrolled hand her gifts and her curses alike, and without control he received them all, and without control he expended them.' He had a celebrated legal dispute with Whistler over a portrait he had commissioned of Lady Eden. Two IMPORTANT EARLY WORKS ON WOMEN'S RIGHTS. The first item is the first English feminist tract, first published the same year, and also attributed to Mary Astell but now generally accepted to be by Judith Drake whose husband wrote the commendatory verses at the beginning. The treatise is a defence against male accusations of ignorance, vanity, enviousness etc. of women and also addresses the faults of men, particularly satirizing some of her contemporaries.

The second work contains a dedication to the Countess of Kildare signed by "Ez. Symson" (inked out in some copies but not in this case), but has been variously attributed to Mary Astell, Judith Drake and H. Wyatt. It was written either in response to, or as a continuation of, *An Essay in Defence of the Female Sex* and contains chapters on Modesty, Piety, Knowledge, Economy, the Rule, Business and Peace. The subjects of the character sketches are a Coquette, Hypocrites, the Conceited Female, a Gamester and the Litigious.

The first work ran into several editions, all of which are scarce in commerce, but the second does not appear to have been reissued.

After her death Currer's half-brother sold most of the library at Sotheby's in 1862, where it fetched nearly £6,000; and a second tranche in 1916 raised more than £3,700.


Ezra Pound had arranged with William Bird, the owner of The Three Mountains Press to publish a series of six volumes by contemporary writers, under the collective title The Inquest into the State of Contemporary English Prose'. Contributors included Pound himself, Ford Maddox Ford, William Carlos Williams and Ernest Hemingway. For his contribution Hemingway selected the 6 sketches that had already been published in *The Little Review* in 1924, to which he added a further 12. The resulting publication was titled *in our time*, an ironic reference to the twelfth line of the Episcopalian Evening Prayer: "Give peace in our time, O Lord".

A SCARCE. This suppressed issue was, according to Carroll, riddled with printing production faults. The illustrations were over-printed, the pages badly folded and it led to him threatening to terminate his contract with Macmillan. This had already been an issue for the first edition of the 1865 Alice, which was recalled after Tenniel complained about the quality of the printing. Only 60 copies had gone out when Carroll intervened. He asked Macmillan to destroy the remainder of the edition, which led to Through the Looking Glass being out of print until 1897. As mentioned in the 'Advertisement' he later changed his mind about destroying the remaining copies of this edition, and instead favoured rebinding it and distributing it to charitable institutions, which had been done with the first suppressed Alice, and as is the case with this copy.

Crutch records the locations of only two rebound copies (Harvard and the collection of Selwyn H.Goodacre, who compiled an unpublished census of copies, with only 4 in the original cloth and 2 rebound).

& Sir Giles Gilbert Scott OM RA FRIBA (1880-1960) was the grandson of the famous Victorian architect, Sir George Gilbert Scott, who was responsible for the Albert Memorial and St Pancras station. Giles has to his credit such notable landmarks as Liverpool Cathedral (1902-10), Battersea Power Station (1929), and Waterloo Bridge (completed in 1945 and known as the Ladies' Bridge because of its largely female construction force). Perhaps his most ubiquitous design was that much more diminutive national treasure, the red telephone box, dating from 1924. But he was also responsible for the Bankside power station, redeveloped in the 21st century to become Tate Modern, and which was at the centre of his grander scheme for the South Bank opposite St Paul's Cathedral. There can be no mistaking the similarity between its principal elevation and that of Scott's proposed South Bank redevelopment as it appears at the bottom of one of his drawings for the scheme in the RIBA collection. The elevations in that drawing and this one both include an elevated road passing in front, in each case with intersections, those of the South Bank drawing being with Southwark and Blackfriars bridges. The primary distinguishing feature between them is simply the absence of a central cooling tower in this drawing.




An excellent example of both the European colonial perspective of Aboriginal people during the early settlement of New South Wales, as well as of Browne's highly distinctive drawing style.

Richard Browne was born in 1776 in Ireland, and little is known of his artistic training or background. However, it is recorded that in February 1810 Browne was tried for an unspecified crime and sentenced to seven years transportation. He arrived in New South Wales in July 1811, and was then sent to Newcastle, specifically a penal settlement for convicts who had committed further crimes in the colony.

Browne appears to have been quickly identified for his idiosyncratic artistic abilities, with Lieutenant Thomas Skottowe, commandant of the 73rd Regiment at Newcastle, employing him to illustrate his manuscript 'Select Specimens from Nature' (now in the Mitchell Library, see IE no. IE1015287). He was recorded to have undertaken several other artistic commissions during his sentence but was to become best known for his portraits of Aboriginal people, which he later sold as souvenirs in Sydney on his release in 1817.

Two other examples by Browne of the figure 'Memora' are known, with the National Library of Australia holding one (see ID no. 1260587), and the other having appeared on the Australian art market in 2010 (see Bonham's Sydney, The Spring Auction Series', 14th Nov 2010, lot 425). The drawing offered in the present lot would appear to be closest to the watercolour sold in 2010, with the National Library of Australia version seeming slightly cruder in execution. The main noteworthy difference between the present portrait and the other two, is the expressive demeanour and the artist's depiction of his character; rather than a grinning smile, the present portrait shows Memora stoic and unsmiling, giving the work a nobility more akin to a colonial record than a caricature.







An impressive panorama by an anonymous Neapolitan artist, stylistically distinct from the contemporary Neapolitan views executed by Gaspar Butler (active Naples c.1720-1733) and Gaspar van Wittel, called Vanvitelli (c.1652-1736). The unusual composition captures the Bay of Naples from an elevated bird's-eye perspective, and the artist would appear to have been familiar with the panoramic views of Naples by Didier Barra (1590-1656), and more certainly the engraved cartographic works of Antonio Lafréry (1512-1577), Georg Braun & Frans Hogenberg, and Alessandro Baratta (*active* 1620-30). These engraved sources of topographical detail were incorporated and transformed by the artist's manipulation of perspective and foreshortening, allowing for a playful and idiosyncratic interpretation of a familiar panoramic view. There are however elements within the painting that appear to be without any pictorial precedent, including the so-called *'lavinaio'*, which was a channel for the flow of rainwater that ran along the Aragonese wall to the east.

The panorama can be securely dated by the inclusion of the Habsburg flag (double-headed eagle crowned on a white field), which is hoisted on Castel dell'Ovo and on the breakwater. From 1714 to the Treaty of Rastadt of 1734, the Kingdom of Naples belonged to the House of Austria.

The first 17 plates in the work, the "septemdecim tabulae" of the title, were drawn by Giovanni Battista Piazzetta (1682-1754), and engraved by Florentia Marcella under Santorini's personal supervision. Santorini intended them for an enlarged edition of his Observationes anatomicae (1724), but died before completing this task. The plates were published 38 years after his death by Michael Girardi, a professor of anatomy at Parma, who added to them two plates by the anatomist Giovanni Battista Covoli, as well as two of his own. It is a work that "belongs to the best of its time ..., not only as regards the dissections and illustrations, but also as to the very elaborate commentary" (Choulant-Frank, p.264).



Originally projected as a multi-volume study of human anatomy and physiology, the work was never finished, yet its importance lies in the intelligent use of new print-making technique of aquatint to illustrate accurate anatomical illustration. Vicq d'Azyr identifies many of the cerebral convolutions, along with various internal structures of the brain (of which many are named after him). For his studies, he was one of the first to use a chemical cocktail of alcohol and other ingredients for brain preservation - which would not become a standard method until the work of Reil (1759-1813) - as well as using horizontal and coronal sections of the brain for studying its anatomy. As permanent secretary to the Paris Academy of Medicine and personal physician of Marie Antoinette, he produced one of the most outstanding anatomical folios that had yet appeared. Vicq d'Azyr had commenced publication of the work in parts, under royal patronage: the allegorical frontispiece shows Louis XVI as Apollo sitting on a cloud watching an anatomy scene. However, the French Revolution prevented its completion, and copies differ in the order in which they are bound.

Virtually all of Bernoulli's work was published in journals: the first edition of Jean Bernoulli's collected works brings together 189 of his papers and 59 of his lectures. Volume I is primarily devoted to problems in geometry and the early calculus, but also contains papers on muscular mechanics, the resistance of solids, and a geometrical demonstration of the motion of pendulums and projectiles in resisting and unresisting media. Volumes II & III are almost totally devoted to problems of mechanics, the first of these containing his theoretical essay on the maneuvering of vessels and related papers, as well as numerous contributions on the analysis of trajectories. His discourse on the laws governing the communication of movement opens volume III, which also contains his essay on celestial mechanics. The final volume contains contributions on the curvature of elastic plates, his mechanico-dynamical propositions, and problems in dynamics. Most important, its appearance in this volume represents the first printing of the Hydraulica, which was written in competition with his son (Bibliotheca Mechanica).

  - 3.1.2 by telephone, in which case you must make such arrangements at least 24 hours before the start of the auction;
  - 3.1.3 by leaving a commission bid at least 1 hour before the start of the auction, which we may execute on your behalf. Commission bids will be accepted with reference to our standard bidding increments and any off-increment bids may be reduced to the next increment immediately below at the Auctioneer's sole discretion. Neither we nor our employees or agents will be responsible for any failure to execute your commission bid. Where two or more commission bid at the same level are recorded we have the right, at our

  - 20.2.2 if sent by first class pre-paid post or Recorded Delivery,2 Business Days after posting, exclusive of the day of posting;
  - 20.2.3 if sent by pre-paid airmail, 5 Business Days after posting, exclusive of the day of posting; or
  - 20.2.4 if sent by email, at the time of transmission unless sent on a day which is not a Business Day or after 17.00 in the place of receipt in which case they will be deemed to have been received on the next Business Day.

#### 21. Data Protection


