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

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Simon was educated at St Edward's School in Oxford before taking up a place at St Thomas' Hospital, London. Following a commission in the RAF he brought his family to Cheltenham, becoming a partner in a GP practice where he developed an expertise in treating drug and alcohol addiction. Always a book lover, he discovered private presses through Alan Hiscox, a local bookseller, who introduced him to the Whittington Press in the eighties and thus began this fine collection.



From this, based on reasoning that alone of all parts of the brain the pineal gland was without a double, he argued that it was the unique locus for connection between the material body and immaterial mind. Although he had written privately on this subject already in Traité de l'Homme during the 1630s, this remained unpublished until after his death. Indeed, Descartes was reluctant even to publish The Passions, since he claimed its original purpose served only as part of his dialogue with the Princess Elisabeth of Bohemia (with whom he held an intimate correspondence between 1643-45), and of whose mind alone he was confident of being sufficiently elevated to understand his arguments contained therein.





This monumental work of Champollion (1790-1832), known above all as the decipherer of the Rosetta stone, is the grand summation of his work in cracking Egyptian hieroglyphs and laid the foundations for all subsequent discoveries in Egyptology. It contains the first printed list of hieroglyphs; 260 in all. The printing, from Champollion's meticulous manuscript, was a complex process. It required a special combination of all the standard alphabetic languages (French, Latin, Greek, Coptic, etc.) to be set in the usual way in type, leaving blank spaces for the hieroglyphs. The typesetting was then transferred to lithographic plates where the hieroglyphs were engraved and then each page, including type and hieroglyphs, was reprinted lithographically. This was the first time such a technique was used in France. Rare in the original printed wrappers; RBH lists no other copy at auction.







Contents: Calendar, in Latin (f5-16), followed by a large collection of devotional works, including prayers to the Virgin and the Trinity; on the Wounds of Christ, the Passion, the Obsecro and O Intemerata, prayers to Saints George, Katherine, Barbara, and Jerome (the last in Latin), and many others, ending in an account of the suitable times for certain prayers to be used and their merits.

Illumination: This fine manuscript combines the works of two skilled illuminators. It was written c. 1460 in Bruges and partly decorated then in the style connected with Willem Vrelant, with three of the full-page miniatures (f 93v, 107v & 133v) and many of the borders, with fruit, flowers &c on fine hairline stems, dating from this period. About 30 years later, four more full-page in borders containing brightly coloured flowers, fruit, and foliage on liquid gold grounds (f 17v, 25v, 41v & 50v) were inserted on added sheets and most of the small miniatures were repainted or added in previously blank spaces.

The full-page miniatures depict: (f 17v) a lady kneeling before the Virgin and Child in a gothic interior, with angels above, the border includes a bird and an armoured figure fighting a snail, (f 25v) God the Father enthroned in the clouds, folding the body of Christ, with two angels, above a landscape, the border includes at the foot a woman admiring herself in a mirror, (f 41v) the Crucifixion with the Virgin, two other saints and three soldiers at foot, in a landscape with a city behind, the border includes two armoured figures jousting on snails, (f 50v) The Virgin and Child enthroned in the sky, with two angels, above a landscape including a river and a city, the border includes a bagpipe player, (f 93v) the Last Supper, at a round table in a gothic interior, John lying on Christ's lap, Judas holding a purse, the border includes birds, a snail and half-length figures of a man and a woman, (107v) the Virgin and other saints praying at the foot of the (empty) cross, a landscape behind, the border includes a bird and two half-length figures, (f 133v) the crucified Christ displaying his wounds to five kneeling figures in a gothic interior, the border including a rabbit, two grotesques and a half-length woman crowning a bird with a human face. The small miniatures and historiated initials include (f 23v, 55r & 69r) Virgin and Child, (f36r) the Scourging, (f59r & 76r) St George and the Dragon, (64r St Bernard, with crozier and book), (67r) St Katherine, (68r) St Barbara; (f 85r Blessed Sacrament), (f 100r-103r) seven small miniatures of different flowers, perhaps replacing the Wounds of Christ, (f103v) Coronation of the Virgin, (f126r) St Jerome and the lion, (f131r) St John the Evangelist, (f141r) St Christopher carrying the Child, (f144r) Christ before Pilate, (f146r) an angel, (f147r) St Adrian, (f147v) St Anthony, (f148v St Elizabeth, (f150r) Nativity of the Virgin. The borders contain, among much else, figures of birds, squirrels, lions, butterflies, a camel, human figures, including a naked woman with a mirror emerging from a snail shell, and several grotesques.

Tibet, Lhasa. "The Potala is a huge square building, topping a little conical hill, with a dozen or so of smaller ones on the slopes below, all flat topped and dotted with blind window arches like the one at the Ta Fo Sau. There is a fine mellow massiveness about the whole design of great square blocks set in the clustering darkness of fine trees. The bell sounded for prayers... and Lamas of all ages came pouring up, clad in all shades of yellow... many in most undignified haste robing as they ran. They filed into a small side temple and squatted in rows... while the head priest in a glorious red cloak, mellow with age marked time with a bell. Then the chief priest came and talked to us and allowed us to photograph him in his cloak, with a wonderful tasselled ornament hanging down his back, he was very friendly and much interested."

Japan. Nihongami. "After we'd done bowing and smiling... I was escorted upstairs to unrobe, and when I came down in my cotton kimono, there was quite a crowd waiting... . It was a drastic process. I don't wonder Jap ladies sleep on a wooden pillow and only have it done once a week... . Then they applied oil and stuff that looked like cobbler's wax and I quailed but endured... the hairdresser-in-chief shooed away her assistants and set to work in real earnest. She scraped me and combed me and tied my unhappy hair with bits of gut, pulled taut with her teeth and she tied on a long tail of black hair and no end of pads.

Bas (Paribas) from 1919 to 1937, and enabled several major French-American industrial collaborations. He is referred to in *Finnegans Wake*, which Joyce was writing at the time of his inscription:

"Here be trouts culponed for ye and salmons chined and sturgeons tranched, sanced capons, lobsters barbed. Call halton eatwords! Mumm me moe mummers! What, no Ithalians? How, not one Moll Pemalas? Accordingly! Play actors by us ever have crash to their gate. Williams visited Massee at his family home at Macon, Georgia and there was introduced both to the larger-than-life William Jordan Massee senior, who formed the basis of *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof's* Big Daddy, and to the clandestine world of young gay men in Georgia who's secretive and at times tortured lives would provide a theme that ran through much of Williams' work. For more on Jordan Massee see lots 57, 59 and 320. Frank Merlo (1922-1963) was Williams' partner of 15 years, representing by far the most stable relationship Williams experienced. Merlo's death in 1963 was a crisis for Williams and marked the start of steady and tragic decline.




The drift of constructive workers away from the Congress started with infpalant's resignation. He describes visits to Palermo, Messina and Mount Etna before they reach Milos; Constantinople is described in detail - "everywhere there are mosques and minarets" - before the hazardous crossing of the mountains from Trebizond to Bayazid - "the inhabitants are miserable and the women unwashed". In the capital of Azerbaijan, Tabriz, the expedition's artist M. Flandin, is attacked after he tries to gatecrash a wedding party, whereupon the guests are fined and administered fifty lashes. In March 1840 they arrive in Teheran where they are warmly welcomed with fanfares "despite the fact that Christians are regarded as dogs".

The publisher, Newbery, recognised the potential of Rickman's anonymous journal, correctly assuming that it would be as successful as Marra's account of the Second Voyage, which he had also published; in fact this is considered the best edition in which the 1781 text is entirely re-edited and expanded. The folding plate, depicting Cook's murder, is of some importance being the first representation in print of Hawaii.





This work was highly influential and was instrumental in the adoption of the Copernican heliocentrism over the Tychonic System.

"At the end of the 1680s, [George Parker, a rival astrologer] alleged, [John] Wing had tried to rush into print a manuscript entitled 'Astronomia nova Britannica', which he had been forced to abandon when Henry Coley exposed it as only half completed. Wing had then reworked the manuscript as *Scientia stellarum*, which he had published despite John Flamsteed's warning that it was itself full of crude errors. Wing issued a pained rebuttal of all these charges in his almanac for 1704, pointing out that his project was essentially an English summary of his uncle's *Astronomia Britannica*, and claiming that Flamsteed, on whose astronomical observations it drew, had commended it." - Oxford DNB.

Vincent Wing, "taught himself arithmetic, surveying, and dialling by the age of twenty, mastered Latin, and acquired a competence in Greek. He spent the rest of his life practising as a surveyor and diallist in the east midlands... . Wing's fame rested primarily on his achievements in astronomy, as a champion of the new astronomical systems of Copernicus and Tycho Brahe. Wing's last and most important work, *Astronomia Britannica* (1669), appeared shortly after his death. This was a large-scale Latin treatise on the size, distance, and motions of the planets according to the Copernican system, documented by numerous observations by Tycho Brahe, Bullialdus, Gassendus, and other continental astronomers, and by Wing himself and a group of English astronomers with midlands connections, notably Samuel Foster, John Palmer, and John Twysden. This volume, aimed at a European as well as English readership, was the most significant English astronomical work of its time and made a considerable impact both in England and on the continent." Wing's nephew, John, "was the son of Moses Wing (bap. 1629, d. 1697?), Vincent Wing's brother. He was a surveyor at North Luffenham, before moving in 1683 to Pickworth, in Rutland, near Stamford, where he practised and taught surveying and all branches of mathematics, including dialling, laying out enclosures, building plans, and music. Like his uncle before him, he also used his almanacs to popularize the new astronomy. He explained and defended Copernicanism, noting in 1690 that many people still adhered to the Ptolemaic system, and wrote brief essays on tides, gravity, the periodicity of comets, and the possibility of other solar systems and inhabited planets within the universe." - Oxford DNB.



Dated in text to 1693 *Scientia Stellarum* was published as a supplement to John Wing's Art of Surveying, a new version of his uncle Vincent Wing's work of the same name. In terms of dating this manuscript, there are several examples designed to aid study of the stars by calculating astronomical events which will occur in 1694. The calculations in another hand at end date from 1701 to 1732 while not by Wing, must have some connection as one of the calculations relates to the latitude of Pickworth, the home of John Wing. The printed text and this manuscript generally conform, with very similar chapter headings, but with some differences in phrasing and paragraphs. The manuscript runs to Chapter 13, the printed work stops at Chapter 11. There follows c. 100 pages of of tables of logarithms, which do not appear to correlate to those in the printed book.







This rare Jesuit treatise on astronomy brings the ideas of Christopher Clavius SJ (1538-1612) up to date, incorporating the more recent thought of Galileo, Kepler and others. Published in the midst of the wider, increasingly polemical, debate between the Jesuits and Galileo, Biancani, as both a member of the Society and an affectionate student of Galileo (from his time in Padova), walked a fine line expressing not only his enthusiasm for the advances being made in astronomy but particularly support for Galileo's stance regarding mountains on the moon, a phenomenon that Clavius doubted right up to his death. Contrary to some interpretations, so sympathetic to Galilean thinking was Biancani believed to be, that none of his remaining writings passed the censorship of his superiors. In this treatise Biancani was also the first to employ the word telescope exclusively and repeatedly in an extended work, instigating its general acceptance.



* The first book of telescopic observations of the planet Venus. Bianchini (1662-1729) sought to determine the rotational period of Venus and to draw a map of its surface. Although his results on the rotation proved incorrect, his topographical observations were a pioneering effort in investigating the planet, identifying 'continents' and 'oceans'. The text is also significant in the history of lunar cartography, notably for the mezzotint views of the crater Plato and the Alpine Valley, which Bianchini was the first to chart, cutting through the mountain range of the Alps; this phenomenon was uncharted by the great Cassini lunar map (1670s). Bianchini's book is perhaps best known today for two often reproduced plates of aerial telescopes, of extremely long focal length, with lenses by Campani.







A Còrdoba's astronomical tables were an important source for Copernicus who referred to them in the *Commentariolus* (the first draft of his planetary theory, which remained unpublished until the late 19th century). However, Còrdoba's identity only became known in the 20th century, previously his work having been known only with the reference Copernicus gives to a 'Hispalensis'; he refers to the length of the year, and mentions the values given by four astronomers: Hipparchus, Ptolemy, al-Battani and 'Hispalensis'. Although little further information is known of Còrdoba, it is supposed he was, in addition to being an astronomer, a doctor of arts and medicine born in c.1458 in Seville. Here bound with the second edition of Regiomontanus's astrological tables, compiled in 1467 and first published in 1490. Arguably the most important astronomer of the 15th century, his tables were also used by Copernicus (Zinner, Regiomontanus: His Life and Work, p. 95).

Grassi, encouraged by his superiors in the Society, herein refuted Galileo's II Saggiatore (1623; itself a response to Grassi's previous treatise Libra Astronomica (1619)), which Galileo had claimed to be so beyond the capabilities of the Jesuits that they were unable to respond. However, since Galileo produced no further retort to Grassi, the Ratio Ponderum came to mark the end of the four year-long polemical scientific and philosophical debate known as, the 'controversy of the comets'.





From the library at Adare Manor, Ireland (purchased at the Christie's sale of the estate in 1982); Edwin R.W Wyndham-Quin (1812-71) third Earl of Dunraven, help a passionate enthusiasm for astronomy and was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society in 1834. 



🞄 Lansberge (1561-1632) was a staunch Copernican, and complained of ecclesiastical opposition to the heliocentric hypothesis of the solar system on theological grounds alone, without examination of the evidence and the scientific arguments in support of this model. He could not, however, accept Johannes Kepler's elliptical orbits, upon which Kepler had based his own Rudolphine Tables published five years earlier. Lansberge produced these rival tables which were founded on a more traditional epicyclic theory; being simpler than Kepler's, they were at first popular and widely used throughout the 1630s, but eventually began to fall from favour as they proved to be less accurate than Kepler's.

Lull invented an 'art of finding truth' which inspired Leibniz's dream of a universal algebra four centuries later. The most distinctive characteristic of his Art is its combinatory nature, which led to both the use of complex semimechanical techniques that sometimes required figures with separately revolving concentric wheels - 'volvelles' - and also to the symbolic notation of its alphabet. These features justify its classification among the forerunners of both modern symbolic logic and computer science. The Art's function as a means of unifying all knowledge into a single system remained viable throughout the Renaissance and well into the seventeenth century. RBH lists only 4 copies of this edition in the last 50 years.

Published in the vernacular, it was immediately more accessible to a far wider audience and by the middle of the century it had been translated into all major European languages, as well as Latin. Following the accepted first edition of 1513, printed in Strasbourg, two undated versions appeared soon after, between which priority was for a long time uncertain. However, research by Joseph Benzing established a distinction between a c.1515 edition issued in Hagenau by Heinrich Gran, and a slightly later one from c.1518 from Cologne. The copy here offered is an example of the latter edition, the differentiation resting primarily on the variant title spelling of 'hebammen rosengarten' as opposed to 'habemmē rosengartē' (Joseph Benzing, 'Zu den ersten Ausgaben des "Rosengarten" von Eucharius Rosslin' in Das Antiquariat, vol. 12, 1956, p. 57-58).








& This edition of the Acta includes a first edition of the important early review of Newton's 'Principia' (1687); pp. 303-315. Of the four reviews which had appeared by the end of 1688, this review in the Acta was the most detailed, and was comprehensive enough to provide many in Europe without access to the Principia itself with a fairly full account of its contents (Gjertsen, Newton Handbook, 1986, p. 472), almost in the style of an extended table of contents. The Acta review is anonymous, but evidence now supports identification of the author as Christoph Pfautz (1645-1711), who being a professor of mathematics at the University of Leipzig, was able to grasp the principal features of Newton's treatment of limits, and to appreciate the significance of the purely mathematical features of Newton's presentation. Pfautz's review gained contemporary fame when it was cited by Leibniz in his own article, 'Tentamen de Motuum Coelestium Causis', in the Acta in 1689. This volume of the Acta also contains three articles by the physicist Denis Papin (1647-1713), two articles by the astronomer Gottfried Kirch (1639-1710) and three articles by the mathematician Jakob Bernoulli (1655-1705).



The present work is a supplement to two earlier works of the same title which had appeared in two different journals in 1903 and 1911-1912 (no offprints known); these are listed on the back cover of this publication, together with Tsiolkovsky's other works, dated from 1891 onwards. Tsiolkovsky was employed as a school teacher and could afford to print only a few copies of his works, which therefore had very limited circulation. RBH lists only 4 copies at auction in the last 40 years, and while the first four lots in the Russian Space History sale at Sotheby's (New York, December 11, 1993) included a total of 38 papers by Tsiolkovsky, the property of his family, this paper was not among them.





- 18.1 You may return any Lot which is found to be a Deliberate Forgery to us within twelve months of the date of the auction provided that you return the Lot to us at your expense in the same condition as when it was released to you, accompanied by a written report by a recognised expert on the subject matter identifying the Lot as a Deliberate Forgery with reference to the catalogue description and fully explaining the reasoning behind any conclusions drawn in the report.

- 19.2 We accept no liability in relation to any of the Seller's warranties at Clause 7 or any breach by the Seller of their obligations under our Conditions of Business.
- 19.3 We do not accept any responsibility to any Bidders for any failure to register a Bidder or any acts or omissions in relation to the sale of Lots and the conduct of our auctions and will not be liable for any loss, damage, expense, costs, loss of profit, loss of business or loss of opportunity as a result of participating in our auctions.

 - 20.1.2 by email (to us at office@forumauctions.co.uk or to you at the email address provided by you at the time of registration unless we are advised otherwise in writing).
- 20.2 Notices will be deemed to have been received:
 - 20.2.1 if delivered by hand, on the day of delivery;
 - 20.2.2 if sent by first class pre-paid post or Recorded Delivery,2 Business Days after posting, exclusive of the day of posting;
 - 20.2.3 if sent by pre-paid airmail, 5 Business Days after posting, exclusive of the day of posting; or
 - 20.2.4 if sent by email, at the time of transmission unless sent on a day which is not a Business Day or after 17.00 in the place of receipt in which case they will be deemed to have been received on the next Business Day.

21. Data Protection

We will hold and process any personal data in relation to you in accordance with our Privacy Policy which can be accessed at: www.forumauctions.co.uk/privacy-policy.

22. General

- 22.1 We may at our sole discretion, though acting reasonably, refuse any person admission to our premises or attendance at our auctions.

Our delay in exercising or non-exercise of any right under these Terms of Sale is not a waiver of that or any other right. Our partial exercise of any right under these Terms of Sale will not preclude any further or other exercise of that right or any other right under these Terms of Sale. Our waiver of a breach of any term of these Terms of Sale will not operate as a waiver of breach of any other term or any subsequent breach of that term.
- 22.5 Our Conditions of Business and any dispute or claim arising out of or in connection with them (including any noncontractual claims or disputes) shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of England and Wales and the parties irrevocably submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts.


