- Agency. As auctioneers we usually act on behalf of the seller whose identity, for reasons of confidentiality, is not normally disclosed. If you buy at auction your contract for the goods is with the seller, not with us as auctioneer.
- 3. Estimates. Estimates are intended to indicate the hammer price that a particular lot may achieve. The lower estimate may represent the reserve price (the minimum price for which a lot may be sold) and cannot be below the reserve price. Estimates do not include the buyer's premium, VAT or other taxes and fees (where chargeable). Estimates may be altered by a saleroom notice.





Vida's works included secular writings on chess and the silkworm, which attracted the attention of an important patron in Leo X. The six books of the Christiad could not have been more important to the Roman Church by the time of their publication under Clement VII. Modelled on Virgil, they weaved the narrative of the Gospels around framework of a Roman epic, and proved to be politically advantageous. The Christiad would be an influence on John Milton.

\* "BLOODY" MARY'S SUMMONS EXILES OPPOSED TO HER RELIGIOUS POLICY TO RETURN TO THEIR DEATHS. An outstanding document going to the heart of the Marian doctrine of chasing down and eliminating those opposed to Mary's religious policy. By 1556 Mary I had executed, usually by burning at the stake, 123 people who had refused to recant their protestant opinions and therefore not surprisingly none of the people listed were prepared to return. The list includes:

- (1). Sir William Wroth (courtier and landowner, one of the four principal gentleman of the chamber, two of whom were to be at all times in personal attendance of Edward VI and were present when he died; proclaimed Lady Jane Grey as queen; joined in proclaiming Princess Mary as queen once her accession became inevitable; sent to the Tower late in July 1553; included in the general pardon; charged with complicity in the rising of Henry Grey, Duke of Suffolk, fled overseas; in 1556 he succeeded in evading a messenger sent from England to recall him, 1518?-73)
- (2). Sir William Stafford (courtier, second husband of Mary Boleyn, sister of Anne Boleyn and mistress of Henry VIII, c. 1500-56)
- (3). Sir Henry Neville (Groom of the bedchamber under Henry VIII, c. 1520-93)
- (4). John Hales (administrator, clerk of the Hanaper, 1516?-1572)
- **(5). Jane Wilkinson** (friend of Thomas Cranmer, d. July 1557).

These orders were delivered personally by messengers on behalf of the queen, and would have posed a threat to the recipients as kidnap was a very real prospect.



Samuel Barton (d. 1710), labelled here as a presbyterian, had been a churchwarden in the 1650s, and lived in a house called Carter's Corner Place in Hellingly, in the Cuckmere Valley. In 1679 Barton sold his house, owned by generations of his family, to his brother-in-law George Luxford, Sheriff of Sussex, possibly because of crippling fines for his nonconformity.

In 1672, Charles II promulgated the Declaration of Indulgence, an attempt to extend religious tolerance to nonconformists and Roman Catholics. It was withdrawn by the king in 1673, under pressure from parliament, and was replaced by the first of the Test Acts. The acts prohibited people who were not proved members of the Church of England from holding public office, and prescribing penal laws for recusants and nonconformists.







An excellent 49er's letter of woe from Culloma [Coloma] on the South Fork of the American River. Coloma had grown around Sutter's Mill, where in 1848 James W. Marshall (who was part of the team constructing the mill) found gold, thereby triggering the California Gold Rush. Babb had travelled west with a company of miners, which dissolved shortly after arrival. He was then ill for a considerable amount of time, compounded by the news of the death of his wife. He gives a vivid picture of the difficulty in surviving - "The miners here are averaging 4 or 5 dollars a day... many worse. The mines are crowded with men & they are still flooding in by hundreds almost daily, a very large majority of whom, to be sadly disappointed... Full seventy five percent of all that have come here... would have been infinitely better off to have staid at home". He adds, "Some of these diggins have been very productive. The course gold is nearly all taken out of them. I should have worked them last winter... if I had not been taken sick". Consequently, at the time of writing he still owed \$75.

In the course of April and May 1720 he was effectively chief minister and minister of finance, a sort of latterday Cardinal Mazarin and Nicolas Fouquet combined; but on 27 May, the first crisis of his 'financial system', he was temporarily dismissed from office and threatened with imprisonment in the Bastille in Paris. Yet the eclipse was only brief: he returned to office on 2 June with the additional responsibilities of the superintendence of French commerce, the director-generalship of the Banque Royale, and a councillorship of state with a seat in the council of regency. With the collapse of his system Law was forced to offer his resignation on 9 December 1720, and he went into exile abroad...." - Oxford DNB.

Before the invention of printing, all books were written with the pen, and the time this took up, made them very expensive. The consequence of which was, that, not having books to read, sew men learned to read, and people were very ignorant and uninformed: but, since this useful invention took place, books have been written and printed on all subjects; they are fold at a price, which most people can afford to pay; every one learns to read, to enjoy the advantage of books; and knowledge, thus generally communicated, has opened the minds of men, instructed them in the several sciencies, made them more sensible, more rational, and more civilized.

Now, to give my reader some idea of the nature of printing, I must first tell him, that every letter is east in a mould, so as to be all uniformly of the same

In a few lines Dickens brilliantly captures the atmosphere of the dinner, and one can imagine his spellbinding table talk to his fellow guests in an effort to make the evening a success. In 1858 Dickens, in three months, gave 85 readings of *A Christmas Carol* and *The Cricket on the Hearth* in over 40 towns across Britain.

Later, after Wilde was convicted of the charge of "gross indecency" and imprisoned in 1895, Constance changed her surname, and those of their sons, to Holland, and forced Wilde to give up his parental rights. Though Holland never saw his father again, he followed the trials and publications with vivacity, and in July 1909 he accompanied his father's friend Robert Ross to witness the reinterment of Wilde's remains from Bagneux Cemetery to Père Lachaise Cemetery in Paris.

Maud Waddell worked as one of several governesses for the Du Maurier children and she is now regarded as having had an important formative influence on Daphne in particular. As a response, Kangxi Emperor revoked his edict of tolerance in 1717 and in 1721 the Christian missionaries were expelled from China.

The plates were published 38 years after his death by Michael Girardi, a professor of anatomy at Parma, who added to them two plates by the anatomist Giovanni Battista Covoli, as well as two of his own.

♣ In 1845 the astronomer and physicist François Arago encouraged Le Verrier to examine anomalies in the movements



of the planet Uranus. Le Verrier began by establishing a precise theory of Uranus which he demonstrated in his memoir 'Recherches sur les Mouvements d'Uranus' (Vol.22, No.22). He showed that the discrepancies in the orbit of Uranus could not be explained by the gravitational effects of the Sun, Jupiter or Saturn, but were in fact caused by the presence of an as yet unknown planet within its orbit. - 15.1.9 refuse to allow you to register to bid, reject or ignore bids from you or your agent at future auctions or impose conditions before we accept bids from you;
- 15.1.10 offset any amounts due from you against any amounts that we may owe you, including if we sell any Lots for you: and/or
- 15.1.11 take any other action we consider necessary.

# 16. Health and safety

Although we take reasonable precautions regarding health and safety, you are on our premises at your own risk. Please note the lay-out of the premises and security arrangements. Neither we nor our employees or agents are responsible for the safety of you or your property when you visit our premises, unless you suffer any injury to your person or damage to your property as a result of our, our employees' or our agents' negligence or wilful default.

# 17. Export and import restrictions

- 17.1 Exporting a Lot out of the United Kingdom or importing it into another country may be subject to legal requirements and restrictions depending on factors such as the type of goods, their age and monetary value and destination. It is your responsibility to ascertain what the requirements are in relation to any Lot and obtain the necessary export or import licence where applicable.

You are solely responsible for identifying and obtaining any necessary licence. - 17.4 We may on request assist you with applying for a licence to export your Lot(s) out of the United Kingdom and will charge a fee for doing so to cover the costs of our time and out of pocket expenses.

# 18. Deliberate Forgeries

- 18.1 You may return any Lot which is found to be a Deliberate Forgery to us within twelve months of the date of the auction provided that you return the Lot to us at your expense in the same condition as when it was released to you, accompanied by a written report by a recognised expert on the subject matter identifying the Lot as a Deliberate Forgery with reference to the catalogue description and fully explaining the reasoning behind any conclusions drawn in the report.
- 18.2 If we are reasonably satisfied that the Lot is a Deliberate Forgery, we will cancel the sale of the Lot and refund the Price to you save that if any of the following circumstances apply:
  - 18.2.1 the catalogue description reflected the accepted view of experts as at the date of the auction;

- 19.1 We give no warranties in relation to any statements or representations made or information given in relation to any Lot by us or our employees or agents whether oral or in writing and accept no liability in connection therewith, including in relation to any errors or omissions unless Clause 18 applies.
- 19.2 We accept no liability in relation to any of the Seller's warranties at Clause 7 or any breach by the Seller of their obligations under our Conditions of Business.
- 19.3 We do not accept any responsibility to any Bidders for any failure to register a Bidder or any acts or omissions in relation to the sale of Lots and the conduct of our auctions and will not be liable for any loss, damage, expense, costs, loss of profit, loss of business or loss of opportunity as a result of participating in our auctions.
- 19.4 If we are found to be liable to you for any reason, our liability will be limited to the Price as paid by you to us for any Lot.
- 19.5 Notwithstanding the above, nothing in these Terms of Sale shall limit our liability (or that of our employees or agents) for:
  - 19.5.1 death or personal injury resulting from negligence;

  - 20.1.1 by delivering it by hand or sending by first class pre-paid post or Recorded Delivery or pre-paid airmail (to us at our registered office address at Ingate Works, 4 Ingate Place, Battersea, London SW8 3NS or to you at the address you provided to us at the time of registration unless we are advised otherwise in writing); or
  - 20.1.2 by email (to us at office@forumauctions.co.uk or to you at the email address provided by you at the time of registration unless we are advised otherwise in writing).
- 20.2 Notices will be deemed to have been received:
  - 20.2.1 if delivered by hand, on the day of delivery;
  - 20.2.2 if sent by first class pre-paid post or Recorded Delivery, 2 Business Days after posting, exclusive of the day of posting;
  - 20.2.3 if sent by pre-paid airmail, 5 Business Days after posting, exclusive of the day of posting; or
  - 20.2.4 if sent by email, at the time of transmission unless sent on a day which is not a Business Day or after 17.00 in the place of receipt in which case they will be deemed to have been received on the next Business Day.

### 21. Data Protection

We will hold and process any personal data in relation to you in accordance with our Privacy Policy which can be accessed at: www.forumauctions.co.uk/privacy-policy.

### 22. General

- 22.1 We may at our sole discretion, though acting reasonably, refuse any person admission to our premises or attendance at our auctions.
- 22.2 Any rights we have to claim against you for breach of our Conditions of Business may be used by either us, our employees or agents, or the Seller, their employees or agents, as appropriate. Other than as set out in this Clause, no other person will have any rights to enforce the terms of our Conditions of Business.

- 22.4 Except as otherwise stated in these Terms of Sale, each of our rights and remedies: (a) are in addition to and not exclusive of any other rights or remedies under these Terms of Sale or general law; and (b) may be waived only in writing and specifically. Our delay in exercising or non-exercise of any right under these Terms of Sale is not a waiver of that or any other right. Our partial exercise of any right under these Terms of Sale will not preclude any further or other exercise of that right or any other right under these Terms of Sale. Our waiver of a breach of any term of these Terms of Sale will not operate as a waiver of breach of any other term or any subsequent breach of that term.
- 22.5 Our Conditions of Business and any dispute or claim arising out of or in connection with them (including any noncontractual claims or disputes) shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of England and Wales and the parties irrevocably submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts.


