& Containing the first printed eye-witness account of Savonarola's Bonfire of the Vanities. First edition, first issue, of Benivieni's Neoplatonic verse summary of the 'Libro dello amore', a commentary on Plato's 'Symposium', published in the wake of Savonarola's tumultuous years of reform in Florence. Humanist Benivieni, along with Tubini, Alopa and Ghirlandi (the printers), were all ardent supporters of Savonarola's thought, with for example, Benivieni having translated Savonarola's 'De Simplicitate' in 1496. Here, across 2ff. (oo6-7), Benivieni describes the famous, dramatic public burning of the city's 'lascivious, vain and detestable objects', known as the Bonfire of the Vanities, held in the Piazza della Signoria during the Carnival on 7 February 1497, offering a detailed list including paintings, musical instruments, feminine ornaments, dice, cards, and other such works of Satan. The edition is known in two variants: this copy appears as the first issue with colophon dated 7 September, and lines 24-25 of the table on $[\pi]3r$.



'Boccaccio's' address to the reader discusses the art of printing and praises the present printer. The woodcut at the beginning of the 'Proemio' shows Boccaccio's seven women and three men seated in a garden for the telling of the tales (this is repeated).


* The Jean Grolier (Dedicatee)-Heber-Christie-Miller copy of this collection of translations of Greek authors. Jean Picard (fl.1540s) was a Parisian bookseller and bookbinder. 'Grolier bought and had bound by Jean Picard at least 230 books, probably more than half his third and final library...All the bindings had Grolier's name, Christian name, and motto tooled on the covers (Hobson, *RBC*, p.59).

Provenance: Jean Grolier de Servières, vicomte d'Aguisy (c.1489/90-1565), Treasurer-General of France and bibliophile, bound for him with his name and personal motto to covers; Richard Heber (1773-1833), his sale, Sotheby's Part I, 10th April, 1834, lot 5135 ('Bibliotheca Heberiana' stamp to front endpaper (cf. Å A beautiful copy of Lodovico Domenichi's Italian translation of Plutarch's *Vitae*, once belonging to the Italian aristocratic Cesi family. The splendid fore-edges bear the full Cesi crest of tree rising from six stylised hills, that of the first volume still particularly rich in colour, and imbue a distinct feeling of luxury to this otherwise sombre and discreet example of sixteenth century armorial binding. This edition of the 'Vite' a re-issue by Giolito with a recomposed title-page dated 1560 (first edition 1555).

Provenance: likely from the library of Federcio Cesi, Duke of Acquasanta (1585-1630), founder of the Accademia dei Lincei (Lincean Academy) in 1603, and one of the most influential patrons of Galileo Galilei. A copy of Giolito's edition of the Vite is mentioned in an inventory of Federico's books located at Acquasparta which never entered the Lincean Academy; seemingly compiled in 1631 following his death to divide inheritance between his second wife, Isabella Salviati (sister of mathematician Francesco Salviati) and his brother, Giovanni Federico Cesi.





A RARE AND IMPORTANT ANONYMOUSLY WRITTEN WORK ON CRIME AND PUNISHMENTS. "One of the most influential books in the entire History of Criminology [...] Beccaria maintained that the gravity of the crime should be measured by its injury to society and that the penalties should be related to this. The prevention of the crime he held to be of greater importance than its punishment...He denounced the use of torture and secret judicial proceedings. He opposed capital punishment, which should be replaced by life imprisonment...and the conditions in prisons should be radically improved... [his] ideas have now become so commonplace that it is difficult to appreciate their revolutionary impact at the time" (PMM).

* These copies are 'fort recherches [...] car ils possedent tous un poeme autographe de l'auteur' (Clouzot, p. 267). The autograph poem is 'à Bibi Purée'. Bibi la Purée, known as 'The King of Bohemia', was a former actor turned vagabond and petty thief, who haunted the streets of Montmartre and the Latin Quarter. He survived by shining shoes, and stealing umbrellas, and was painted by Picasso.





Banking.- Early cheques.- Clayton & Morris, bankers. Group of 14 Early Cheques, and 16 other items relating to Clayton & Morris, including receipts, declarations, letters and memoranda, folds, repairs to 3 documents (with some loss of text), a few tears or holes, some staining, mostly lightly browned, v.s., 1660-1680 (30 pieces).

An important group of early cheques, the earliest of which (22nd November, 1660) pre-dates the earliest held in the collection of the Bank of England. Bills of exchange had previously been issued, but the cheque drawing on an individual's own funds to make an immediate payment was invented in England in the mid-seventeenth century. All the cheques here were written by Thomas Yates, Principal of Brasenose College, Oxford, from 1660 to 1681, the earliest being for PS100 to Clement Farnham. Clayton & Morris was founded by Robert Clayton (1629-1707) and John Morris (1625-82), who went into business together in 1658, and were the first bankers to use the mortgage as a long-term security for loans.

Order to the royal Jewellers Francis Sympson and John Sympson, to make "certaine Medalls of gold, enameled with such pictures and devices as might bee more suitable to their respective qualities and degrees" for Sir Edward Bysshe Clarencieux King of Arms and William Dugdale Norroy King of Arms, D.s. "Charles R", manuscript on vellum, 3 hand-coloured coats of arms designs in left margin, folds, slightly creased, 335 x 441mm., Whitehall, 16th 1663.

An order by Charles II to his jewellers on behalf of Clarenceux and Norroy kings of arms at the heralds college, for two medals to enhance their prestige while undertaking their various visitations of counties. The order was for two medals "of fine gold, enameled on the one side with the Royall Armes of England Scotland France and Ireland, in single and distinct Escocheons and an Imperiall Crowne above the head of each, with a red Rose including the white in the midst thereof, and our Royall Cypher betwixt every Escocheon; and on the other side the Armes of their distinct Offices of Clarencieux and Norroy."

I had some Business to do in ye Strand... I was walking along, I saw a number of People got together about a Bookseller's shop. My curiosity lead me to make one & I just came as a man was getting up a Ladder to hang on a Sign for the Shop, which was new and fitted up very handsomely. I jostled in amongst the Crowd to see whose head had the honour of being Exalted; when behold, I saw my own, & my name written about it, in Letters as Tall as Myself. You may imagine I was much disconcerted to be thus caught; however I slunk away as fast as I could...", good remains of red wax seal (cracked), small tear where opened, 3 small tears along folds, remains of tape at head and tail of letter, slightly browned.

Venomous toads.- White (Rev. Gilbert, naturalist, author of the "Natural History of Selborne", 1720-93) "The Benevolence of Modern Naturalists hath induced them to pronounce the toad Harmless...", manuscript in a juvenile hand probably written at White's dictation, together 2pp., first page statement by White with eleven corrections in the text, watermark royal coat of arms, fold, browned, edges slightly creased and chipped, folio, n.d. [18th century].

* White's statement on the venomous properties of the toad and with a series of thermometer readings. Editor Thomas Bell describes as "Gilbert White's statement" on the venomous properties of the toad, first printed in a footnote (signed 'T. B.') on pp.51-52 of the first volume of Bell's 1877 edition of The Natural History of Selborne (London: John Van Voorst, 1 Paternoster Row). The following note by Bell, prefixed to White's "statement", indicates the significance Bell placed upon it, and the circumstances of its composition: "The habit of close observation of nature which was so conspicuous in White himself was communicated by his example to many who came within the sphere of his influence... . The following account, which I find amongst his papers, is a striking example of this. The observer was doubtless no other than his old gardener, Thomas Hoar, a quaint original, who was many years in his service. The account is not in White's handwriting, but evidently written from his dictation, as it is in a boy's hand, and has several verbal corrections, and the diction is his own." The present manuscript text of White's 'statement' - corresponds to the 1877 printed version in all but accidentals: it is not in White's handwriting, but in "a boy's hand"; it has "several verbal corrections", and the diction is White's own. The layout of the "statement" is, in addition, very similar to that of the original manuscript of the Natural History, suggesting the possibility that the leaf it is written on once formed part of it. Two factors reinforce the impression that the document was used by a printer. Firstly, in pencil, at the head of the page, is written "Copied & printed". Secondly, added in ink at various points in the document are what appear to be two printer's marks: first, a symbol of a dot in a circle, repeated once; and another symbol of a square with a central vertical line through it, also repeated once. On the reverse of the document are thermometer readings which White is known to have carried out on a daily basis.



Dalton, acting assistant commissary. After heavy fighting the Zulu army "fell back on the appearance of the British 3rd column. The number of Zulu killed was more than 370 out of about 3000—the wounded were carried off. The British force had fifteen killed and twelve wounded." - (Oxford DNB). Eleven Victoria Crosses and five Distinguished Conduct Medals were awarded to survivors of Rorke's Drift.

The character of Psmith was introduced by Wodehouse in the second half of *Mike* (1909). The character, with suave sophistication, unflappable temperament and dry wit, was a departure from schoolboy characters that had characterised Wodehouse's early career and was popular with readers. Wodehouse swiftly revisited the character in *Psmith in the City* (serialised October 1908 - March 1909) before making a second trip to New York where he successfully sold two stories for \$500. The income from this sale far exceeded his usual rate and encouraged the author to stay in the city to take advantage of the lucrative American market. It was with this aim in mind that "Psmith USA" (changed on p. 71 of the present manuscript to the published *Psmith, Journalist*) was begun.

While Wodehouse sold several stories in the US he was unable to establish a permanent relationship with any publisher that might have guaranteed an income and therefore returned to the UK in 1910. Still however hoping to appeal to his transatlantic readers, he combined a reworking of the plot of the present work with a romance, to be published in the US as *The Prince and Betty*, 1912 (quite different from the work of the same name that appeared in the UK). The three missing chapters from the present manuscript would appear (in reworked form) at the end of the US edition of *The Prince and Betty*. Psmith, Journalist would be serialised in *The Captain* from October 1909 to March 1910, before finally appearing in book form in 1915 (see lot 130).



De Grasse managed to return to France, to find himself heavily criticised for the disaster. In this account he produces evidence, including the finely detailed battle plans, to be laid before the Council of War exonerating himself and laying the blame on others. It was distributed to those thought interested in his defence, which was ultimately successful, the Council acquitting him with honour.







On the declaration of War against Holland in 1781, Admiral Rodney was ordered to seize St. Eustatius. This he accomplished, capturing an enormous amount of merchandise and wealth. Much of the spoil he confiscated and much that he sold belonged to English merchants, so that his action brought a storm of criticism which was followed later by many law-suits against him.

Sabin 8828 lists only the 1789 published edition. The last copy cited by RBH was in a Lathrop Harper catalogue in 1975 (\$550).

Andrade was the first European to cross the Himalayan range, the first to enter Tibet, and the first to return with a description of the country, its people, and their religion.
